TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

OTTAWA, April 26. The principal item in the House yesterday was the discussion on McNeill's resolution that if and when the Parliament of Great Britain admits Canadian products to its markets in the United Kingdom on more favorable terms than it accords to foreign countries, the parliament of Canada will be prepared to accord corresponding advantages by a reduction in the duties it imposes upon British manufactured goods. He supported the resolution ably, showing the advantages to be derived from preferential trade with Great Britain. Hon. L. H. Davies said that he was prepared to go further than the mover of the resolution, and that was to reduce the duties on British goods whether Great Britain will discriminate against other countries or not. He moved an amendment to the effect that the present scale of duties on British goods imported into Canada should be reduced. Hon. Mr. Thompson showed that there was no sincerity in the remarks of Mr. Davies, nor in his filibustering resolution. Davies' amendment was lost by 64 to 98.

Mayor Thomas Released.

Heavy Damages.

HALIFAX, April 26. Yesterday afternoon Mayor Thomas, of Truro, who was sent to jail by the Legislature of Nova Scotia for contempt, was released on a writ of habeas corpus, Judges Ritchie, Graham, Meagher and Townshend being unanimous in their decision. The whole Dominion is laughing at the boomerang that followed the action of the Premier. Mayor Thomas will be given a great reception on his return to Truro to-day. He will bring suit for heavy damages against the Premier, the Attorney General and others who voted for his arrest and imprisonment.

The Redistribution Bill.

P. E. Island to Have Five Constituencies.

OTTAWA, April 26. The scope of the Redistribution Bill as affecting the Maritime Provinces is not fully decided, but this proposition is under consideration, viz.: Cape Breton County to lose one member, and a portion of that county to be added to Richmond; P. E. Island to be divided into five single member constituencies. In New Brunswick it is said Queen's and Sunbury will be united, thereby dropping one member; and St. John is to be deprived of one member.

The Newfoundland Dispute.

OTTAWA, April 26. The Government has received a communication from the Newfoundland authorities refusing the generous offer of the Dominion Government for the establishment of a status quo this season, pending the conference to settle the fisheries dispute. Newfoundland will consent neither to status quo nor to a conference, unless Canada withdraws her objections to the Claims-Bond Convention. As the Dominion authorities cannot consent to such a proposal for the present, it appears as if the present strained relations will continue.

The Welland Election.

TORONTO, April 26. The election to be held in Welland next Friday will be a hot contest. The chances are in favor of the Conservative candidate. Wm. McLean, of the World, will again be the Government candidate in East York, Mackenzie's old constituency.

The Quebec Legislature.

QUEBEC, April 26. The Local Legislature opens to-morrow. P. E. LeBlanc will be elected Speaker.

Hon. J. Turner Dead.

ST. JOHN, April 26. Hon. J. Turner, M. P. P. for Albert, died at Fredericton yesterday.

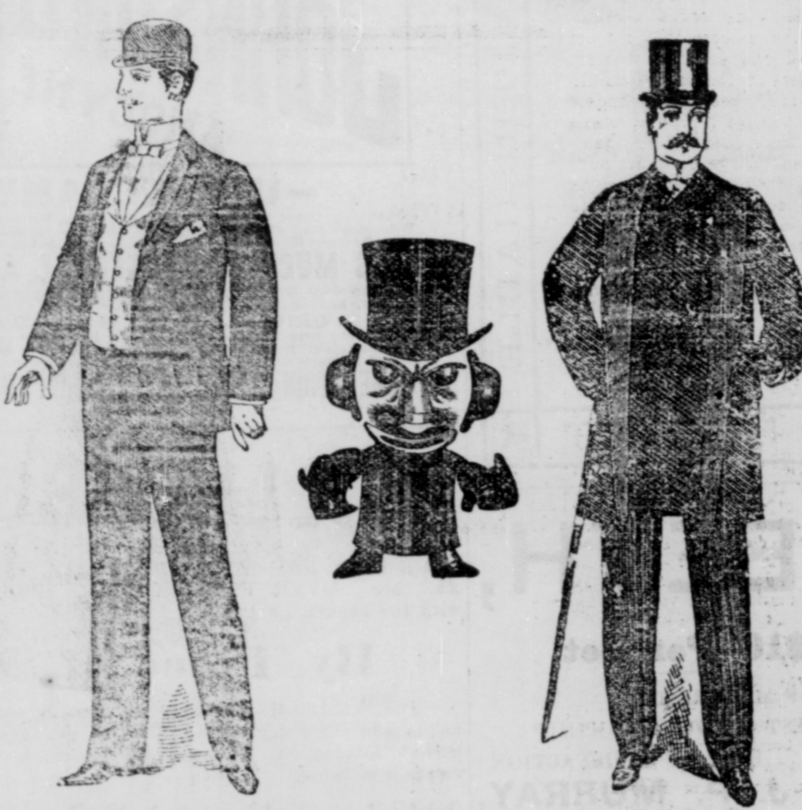

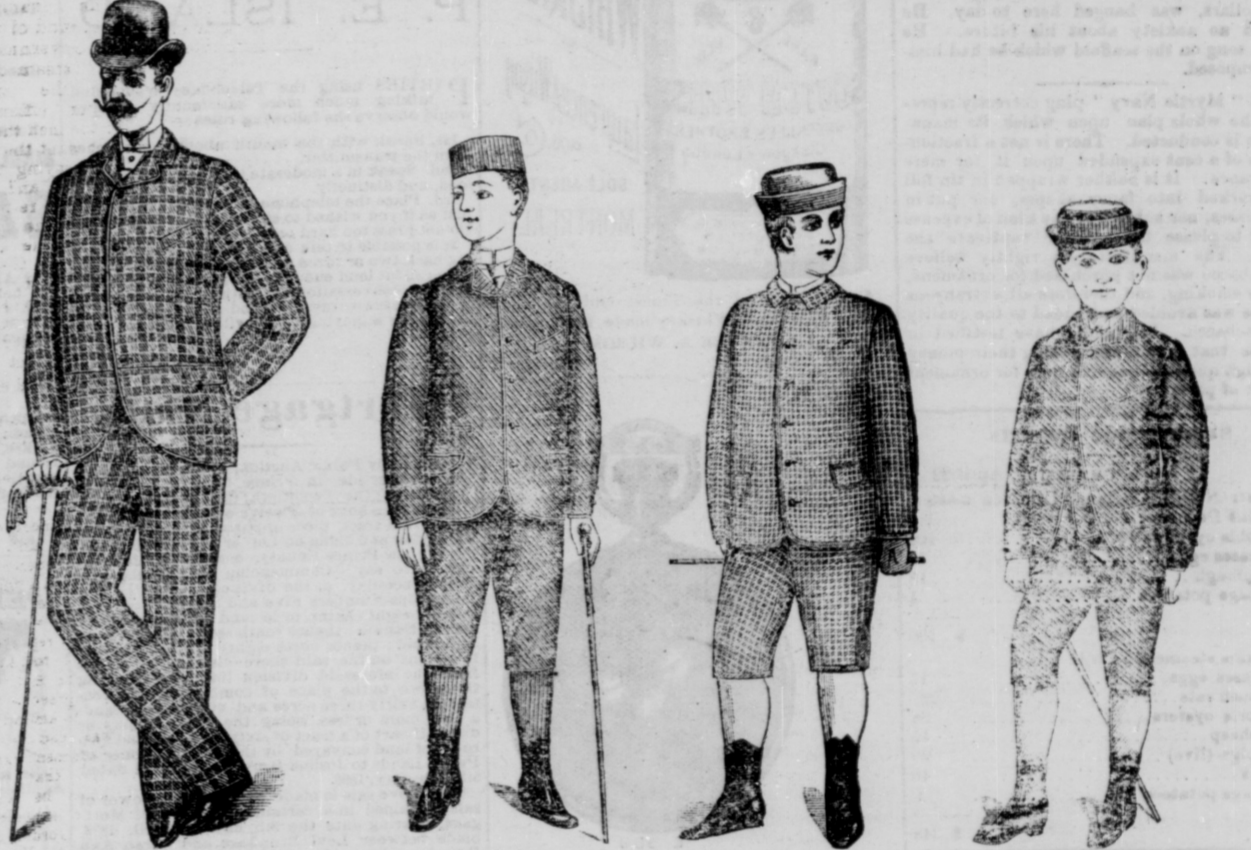
