Sandra Rood, July Allen and Cora Cook, all students at Prince in the Walds College, moved to Bangor, Maine, last week-end.

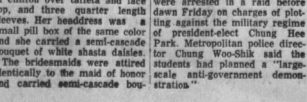
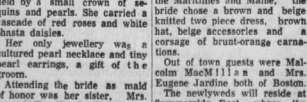
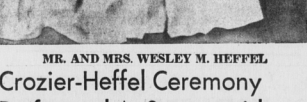

Then he started banging around a neighborhood saloon. There he fell in with a group of men and women who treat the saloon as a sort of clubhouse.

After five years of conflict on that score he finally left me for one of these women. How can a man do that to a decent wife after 40 years?

I am very lively, heartbroken and sick, living on a small social security pension. I long for companionship, someone to talk to. I can hardly believe

this has happened to me. What have I got to look forward to? Dear M. H. In your tragically isolated situation, wherein your spirit has hit bottom, you need very specific guidance.

The most immediate help of the kind I can suggest, at this distance (and it will be help enough to change your course for the better if you act on it) is to read Wingfield Hope's profoundly wise, sagely encouraging book about marriage, titled "Life Together" (Sheed and Ward, \$5.00).

With inexorable logic, Wingfield Hope rekindles our awareness of the fact, from the Christian view, that marriage represents a contract in the sight of God and men is an irrevocable reality that endures for a lifetime.

Thus, thought your husband has taken wing with a trolop, he has not ceased to be your husband. Nor has your marriage come to an end. You are still a wife, and your husband is not a mirage and it may be that your current mission - God's
