BUT WHERE WILL I LIVE?

The 3 residences on campus provide housing for 480 students in their choice of private, semi-private, or apt.-style rooms. The 3 residences are Bernardine (girls), Marian (boys) and Blanchard (Co-Ed.).



Bernardine Hall is a 4 storey building with 68 semi-private and 15 private rooms. Each room has an intercom to provide two-way communication with the main desk. Each floor has a central service area including laundry facilities and phones. Also, each floor has a kitchen, T.V. lounge and a sound proofed reading room with individual study desks. The building is carpeted throughout and has a recreation and reception lobby on the ground floor.
