It was decided that the list of tax defaulters would be presented to the magistrate as scheduled on Wednesday.

"Earn Money At Home" Is Basis Of Growing Rackets

WASHINGTON (AP)—It sounds so easy. Earn anywhere from \$50 a week to \$20,000 a year as your own boss. No selling. No risk. Just work a few hours a week and rake in the profits.

That's the come-on in a new multi-million-dollar wave of swindles, keyed to the theme of making extra income at home, now sweeping the United States from coast to coast.

America's fastest-growing racket—and one of the cruelest—is reflected in a rising clamor of outcries from victims who have fallen prey to fly-by-night artists operating on the fringes of legitimate business.

The National Better Business Bureau says doubtful earn-at-home ventures are gouging the U.S. public to the extent of \$500,000 a year. Chairman John W. Gwynne of the Federal Trade Commission calls it "particularly vicious" because the victims are usually in desperate need of a few extra dollars to pad out skimpy incomes.

Many risk—and lose—their lifetime savings in the hope of finding security.

These simple arduous, with prices on the upswing, the \$2 swindle is beginning to fade out of the picture as greedy tricksters reach for higher brackets.

ONE ANSWER

One of the answers, it seems, is vending machines.

"It's the biggest racket confronting us today in the field of earn-at-home swindles," said William S. Hill, counsel to the FTC.

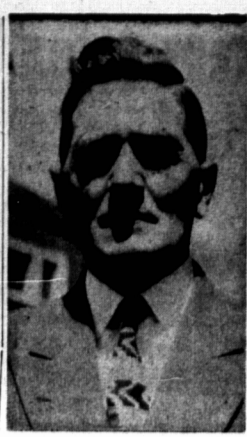
"Unscrupulous promoters sell junky vending machines for \$50 to \$100 apiece with a promise they'll be installed at sure-fire sales locations. All the owner has to do is keep the machines filled with merchandise—candy bars, cigars, razor blades and so on—and carry a big sack to collect profits of \$400 to \$500 a week.

"That's what the promoter says," Hill continued.

What frequently happens, he said, is that the machines arrive by freight along with a list of "suggested" locations—and by that time the promoter has disappeared forever.

"The man who bought the machine goes to the locations, and it's either a ratty little tavern on skid road or the proprietor refuses to let the machines, clutter up his premises," Hill said.
