## Incident May Be Up In Commons

LONDON (CP) — An incident during a cross telephone line between Buckingham Palace and Canada House may wind up in the House of Commons.

Tom Driberg, labor member of Parliament and journalist, dialled in by accident some time ago to a conversation between the palace and the Canadian government offices, regarding a speech that the Duke of Edinburgh is to make Thursday to the Royal Aeronauti- cal Society.

Driberg let his readers into the discussion Dec. 5 and started a rumpus. Conservative MP Henry Price has written to the assistant postmaster-general, David Gam- mans, to find out whether Driberg can legally publish a conversation he picks up accidentally on the telephone.
