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## Thoughts For Our Time

### HUMAN FATHERHOOD

No one will dispute the truth of  
the old maxim: "The hand that  
rocks the cradle rules the world."  
But there is a chance that the tri-  
butes we pay to mothers have  
tended to obscure the importance  
of the father's role in the family.

It is true, in recent years, we  
have been celebrating Father's  
Day, honoring him on a Sunday  
in June. But there seems to be  
almost an apology implied in our  
centering on that one day, a senti-  
mental admission that we have  
not really grasped and honored his  
position in the family.

But the basis of our devotion to  
fatherhood is more than senti-  
ment; this respect is based on the  
very order according to which God  
has patterned His creation. To  
human beings He gave the power  
of love; and in marriage this love  
expresses itself in a creative act.

God uses human love to further  
His creative work. And as God has  
full dominion over His works, He  
grants a share of that authority to  
those of His creatures who have  
shared with Him that creative  
work. And this authority of God  
is not a blind force, expressing it-  
self in a set of senseless prohibi-  
tions called commandments. The  
authority of God is a manifesta-  
tion of His love, showing His  
creatures the nature of human  
happiness, and setting up guides to  
that happiness.

Because the father is the source  
of the physical life of the child-  
ren in a family, it is he who has  
the greater share of the authority  
in the little world of the home.  
And the manner in which he uses  
or fails to use that authority, will  
determine the pattern of the lives  
and happiness of the members of  
that little world.

Among the important contribu-  
tions made by modern psychol-  
ogists is the reaffirmation of the  
primary importance of the father  
in the development of a child's at-  
titude toward God and the world.  
By the very instinct of his nature,  
the child's first sense of depend-  
ence is expressed in his relations  
with his parents; his clinging to  
his mother, his joy in throwing  
himself against his father's chest  
or resting in peace in his arms.

As the child grows mentally, and  
the formative notions of his intel-  
lectual life develop, his ideas of  
religious realities are patterned on  
the things he knows best. Now the  
most important of all the ideas  
which mold a child's relig-  
ious life, is the idea of God. If  
the one human person on whom  
that idea is modeled fails as a  
human person and as a father, the  
religious life of the child cannot  
have the natural foundation which  
a full supernatural life demands.

God exercises His own authority  
with wisdom, with justice, with  
mercy, and the reward of serving  
Him perfectly is a fullness of joy  
beyond our fondest imagining. And  
these are the characteristics that  
should mark the human father's  
exercise of his authority as head  
of the family; they are the char-  
acteristics that a child must find  
in the person upon whom he is to  
fashion his idea of God.

Never, for example, should the  
child feel that the father's com-  
mand is just a foolish whim, an  
irrational impulse which leaves the

son or daughter confused and be-  
wildered; the father's calm con-  
sidered judgments should be a  
faint image at least of the Divine  
Wisdom, disposing all things  
sweetly.

A child, even from infancy, needs  
a sense of confidence in the mercy,  
in the willingness to understand  
human weakness, of his father.  
But this weakness is not a senti-  
mental, flaccid emotion that is a  
confession of weakness. In our  
day, unfortunately, the failure to  
exercise proper paternal authority  
or administer proper punishment,  
has its root in this false notion of  
mercy. Mercy is rather a real  
virtue which recognizes the evil,  
points it out, but withholds, as  
God withholds, punishment for a  
time, even from those who sin  
against Him, in His understanding  
of their human frailty.

There are children who think  
of God as a kindly, confused old  
gentleman, easily fooled. Who  
really could not punish us. They  
have not witnessed the constant  
exercise of justice in their father,  
justice which demands obedience  
and reverence to authority, and  
metes out punishments in due  
measure when that authority is  
disregarded. But always the father  
must show that it is his reason  
and not his passion of anger, that  
governs the exercise of this virtue.  
Otherwise, the child's picture of  
authority will be that of an irra-  
tional, arbitrary force.

And finally, the father should  
be a source of joy in the home,  
generous with his time for play,  
his laughter, and with his rewards  
for obedience. It is unfair to a  
father—and to God—to restrict his  
role in the home to that of execu-  
tioner: "I will wait till your father  
comes home."

Fathers and young men who will  
one day be fathers, do well to ask  
God daily for the grace they will  
need to exercise their share of His  
authority in their little world of  
the family with prudence, justice,  
mercy and joy.

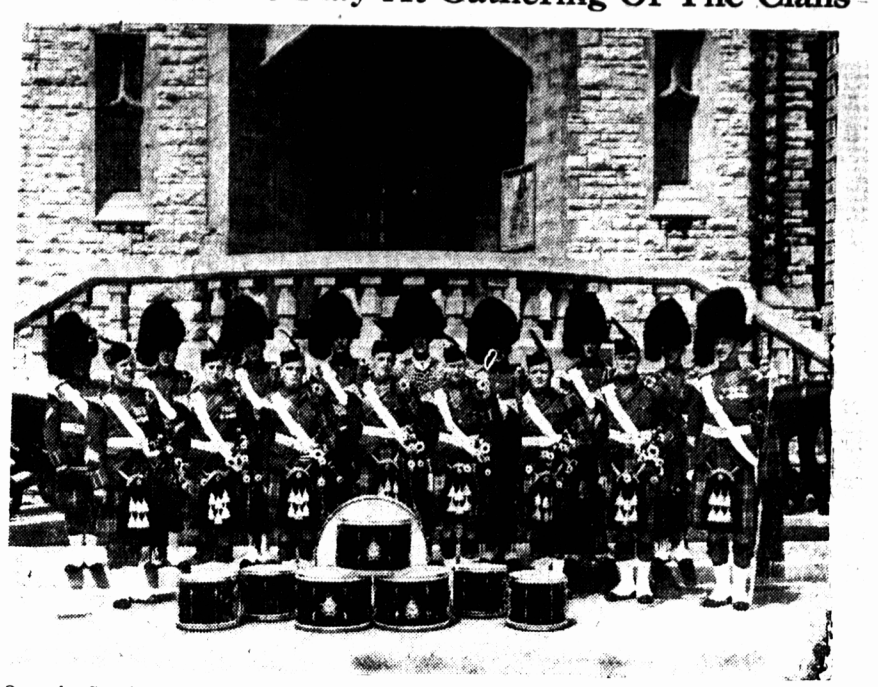
Over 125 kiddies, the children of
