

Phillies Defeat Dodgers Yanks Lose; Braves Lose

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Willie Jones' two-run triple broke Don Drysdale's spell over Philadelphia Phillies and led the phils to a 2-1 victory over Brooklyn Dodgers Friday night behind Robin Roberts' fine pitching.

Jones got his hit, to right field, in the fourth inning with two on and two out. Gran Hamner's one out double started the rally and was the first hit the Phillies off Drysdale in 10 2-3 innings. He beat them here last Monday night, 5-1, on two hits, both in the second inning.

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Willie Mays ran his consecutive game hitting streak to 19 with an eighth inning double, then scored the winning run a few minutes later as New York Giants defeated Pittsburgh Pirates 3-2 Friday night.

Mays opened the eighth with his

double and advanced to third on Hank Bauer's bunt single as relief pitcher Roy Face fielded the ball but third baseman Gene Freese failed to cover the bag. Fleet-footed Willie scored on Ray Kat's fly but came up with a limp after sliding hard across home plate. He stayed in the game, however.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Jim Lemon's single with two out in the ninth inning scored Herb Plews from second base to give Washington a 3-2 victory over Boston Friday night.

Tom Brewer, victim of two unearned runs, lost his fourth decision against six wins, while Truman Cleveland won his second in relief for the Senators.

Shortstop Billy Klaus bobbed Plews' grounder with two outs in the ninth and White Herzog's singled moved Plews to second

before Lemon broke up the game with a single to left.

KANSAS CITY (AP)—Ned Garver pitched a masterful four-hitter and Billy Hunter smacked a home run as Kansas City Athletics broke out of a four-game losing streak with a 3-1 victory night.

NEW YORK (AP)—Al Piliarek drove in two runs with a homer and sacrifice fly Friday night as Baltimore Orioles defeated New York Yankees 3-1 behind the tight five-hit pitching of Ray Moore.

Piliarek, a stubby, 26-year-old sophomore, belted his second home run of the season — and his first in two games — off loser Bob Turley to get the Orioles started in the third inning. His sacrifice fly came in the fifth, after Jim Brideweser doubled and moved to third on Moore's sacrifice. Brideweser and the called catcher Sherm Lollar lofted his No. 7 homer into the left field stands.

The Cards collected 11 hits as they hung the loss on Milwaukee rookie Juan Pizarro who is now 2 and 4 for the season.

CHICAGO (AP)—Pitching his first complete game since last August 23, right-handed pitcher Bob Keegan Friday night choked off Detroit Tigers on four hits for a 6-0 victory that stretched Chicago White Sox league lead to four games.

Sherm Lollar's two-run homer in the first inning and Walt Dropo's grand slammer in the eighth made it easy for Keegan.

While New York Yankees were losing 3-1 to Baltimore, the White Sox added up their 15th decision in their 19 games and cut the Detroit three-game winning streak. The Sox, making it 4-0 over Detroit this season, spoiled hard-luck Frank Lary's performance with two runs in the first inning.

Minnie Minosa was safe at first on a holder's change that sealed the Sox' victory at second. The catcher Sherm Lollar lofted his No. 7 homer into the left field stands.

Lary, the American League winningest hurler last year with a 21-13 mark, absorbed his second loss in two games. In one stretched he retired 14 batters in a row.

All of the 35-year-old Keegan's yield were singles. He struck out two and served only one walk.

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Eddie Kasko delivered four hits in four innings Friday night as he stalked St. Louis Cardinals to a 4-3 victory over Milwaukee Braves in a game that produced a total of 20 hits.

The defeat left the Braves in a tie for third place with Philadelphia, who defeated the second place Brooklyn Dodgers 2-1.

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SPORT FROM BRITAIN

Commonwealth Golfers Find Glasgow Reception Is Cold

LONDON (CP)—For the second year in a row Commonwealth professional golfers are voicing complaints about standstill treatment in British tournaments.

Echoing criticism made last year by Canadian golfers Stan Leonard of Vancouver and Al Balding of Toronto and Port Credit, Ont., Australian professional Bruce Crampton says officials in Glasgow's Killermont club were guilty of "snobbery and rudeness" during the recent £4,000 tournament there.

Other visiting players backed up Crampton's contention that their reception by Glasgow officials had been "cold," apparently because they were professionals. But John Monahan, Monahan, secretary of the Killermont club, retorted that "we treat professionals and amateurs alike."

Crampton says players were not allowed to have tea in the clubhouse between rounds, but were relegated to an outdoor marquee. He also says competitors were barred from the park and had to leave their vehicles about half a mile from the clubhouse, completing the journey by bus.

SORE POINT

Last year Leonard and Balding, who represented their country in the Canada Cup matches, cut short a golfing tour of Britain and returned home after protesting about lack of hot meals and suitable accommodation for players competing in the British Open at Liverpool.

The British attitude to professional players has long been a sore point with golfers from the United States and Commonwealth countries. In Britain some clubs still regard their professional as very much a "hired hand." Members and professionals mix freely on the course, but in the clubhouse it "just isn't done."
