The McKenzie Tariff

The Patriot constantly asserts that the country is anxious to return to the "judged trade policy" of the McKenzie administration. We agree with the Toronto Mail that there is nothing to support this view; and that, on the contrary, so far from the Opposition gaining ground, they are steadily losing it, as the bye elections show. It is noteworthy also that, even in the most pronounced Reform strongholds, abuse of the new tariff is not popular. In a speech which he made at Bright the other day, Mr. Pattullo, the straight out Opposition candidate in North Oxford, confessed that "while he did not think that the N. P. was all or nearly all that its supporters in 1878 had promised, and while he felt that it needed improvement, yet he was free to say that Mr. Mackenzie would have bettered the interests of the Reform party, and would, in his humble judgment, have shown more policy, had he somewhat remodelled his own tariff." Evidently Mr. Pattullo, who, as the chief organizer of the party, has had his hand on the political pulse of Ontario since 1876, does not agree with the Globe that that the people are pining for the old jug-handled system.

Mr. McKenzie.

The Toronto Mail calls attention to the treatment Mr. McKenzie is receiving at the hands of his friends. Last session he was unceremoniously hustled out of the leadership. The Rouges abused him in the press and the caucus, and Ontario members, who had followed him obsequiously for five years, rebelled against him, and said hard things behind his back. Not content with deposing him, they made him abjure his Pacific railway policy; and in Oxford, the "banner" county, they cast his devotion to free trade in his teeth, and taunted him with having injured the cause! Death having robbed him of his life long patron and protector, the very youngsters in the party pelt him; and there is not a Reform journal in the province to stand up for him and say: "Why assail this man? If he blundered, Mr. Blake shared the responsibility. If he made mistakes, we approved them."

A Remarkable Exhibit.

In noticing the remarkable increase of revenue during the first five months of 1880—the increase being, over the revenue of 1878, \$2,886,167, and over that of 1879, no less than \$3,060,153—the Toronto Mail remarks: "A Government with such an exhibit of revenue need not fear to summon Parliament, and an Opposition with such figures before them will find it difficult to make people believe that Canada is ruined and that it is unable to carry out its projected enterprises."

Cape Tormentine Railway.

The Toronto Mail says:—"Among several short lines of a local character which will be put under construction the principal will be the Cape Tormentine line, which, besides opening up a fine tract of country, will give a shorter and safer route to Prince Edward Island."

A Pacific Declaration.

The Agence Russe of St. Petersburg publishes the following declaration:—"All the Powers are equally desirous of peace. It is natural that there should be some difference as to the best means of assuring it. Russia shares England's views, but places the maintenance of the European concert above her own preferences, and will favor the course most conducive to its continuance." The foregoing is in reply to Russian newspaper criticism in regard to the attitude of Austria, France and Germany.

Jews in Germany.

The Jewish question continues to attract much public attention at Berlin. Newspapers are debating it, pamphlets are pouring forth, tumults are taking place among the students and an occasional fracas still occurs in the streets. A large number of eminent Jews will meet to consider steps to defend themselves. It is proposed to establish a journal to support their cause. An officially inspired writer in the Grenzboten seeks to vitiate Prince Bismarck from the imputation of sympathy with the anti-Jewish movement.

The Combined Fleet Dispersed.

The Vienna Political Correspondence publishes a telegram from Badisic, which says:—"Admiral Seymour has given notice to the commanders of the various squadrons of the dissolution of the combined fleet. The British squadron will leave to-morrow for Malta and the French squadron for Toulon." It is stated that Austria has rejected the British proposal that the international fleet should, for the present, cruise in company, and that the Austrian, and probably the French squadron, will leave Cattaro very shortly.

A CANDY-EATING HORSE.—A candy-eating horse is the property of Mr. Pratt of Albany, N. Y. Every morning he is driven to the banking house of H. R. Pierson, and as soon as his master leaves him, he bolts across the street, and from a woman keeping a stand gets a stick of candy, eats it, and awaits the arrival of his master, who pays the vendor.

Irish News.

(By Telegraph to the New York Herald.)

DUBLIN, Dec. 3.—The war of the Irish peasantry continues unabated. While a police sergeant named O'Connor was, on Wednesday night, walking just outside Clarenmorris, he was attacked and brutally beaten by a party of men who, after having knocked him down, kicked him about the face and head in a fearful manner. O'Connor, who had made himself conspicuous by his efforts to provide conveyances for the Boycott relief expedition, was subsequently discovered unconscious on the road. He cannot identify his assailants. Two young men, named Hayes and Little, were arrested yesterday on suspicion of having been concerned in the attack. Some threatening notices have been posted near Ballyboody, cautioning a tenant farmer in the locality to give up the farm he lately took on the estate of Lord Waterpark, for which he paid a large sum. The former tenant had been evicted for non-payment of rent. The notices called on shopkeepers and tradesmen to refuse to have any dealings with him. A farmer residing near Clogheen is at present being "Boycotted," because he had taken a farm from which a former tenant was lately evicted for non-payment of rent. His goods will not be bought in the market. Shopkeepers refuse to sell him anything. His servants have left him. He can get no one to take their places. His horses will not be shod by the smith. In fact, in no way will anybody have anything to do with him till he gives up the farm. The Crown has issued summonses against thirty-six persons who formed part of the crowd collected at Keskearrogan when Michael Barret, bailiff to Philip O'Reilly, attempted to collect grazing rents for a farm surrendered by a Mr. Murphy. On the occasion in question Barret's horse and car were turned back by the people. He was only permitted to pass when an escort of constabulary arrived. The charge is for "unlawful assembly."

DUBLIN, Dec. 4.—The Viceroy issues a proclamation to-night stating that county Leitrim is in a disturbed state and ordering a large number of extra police to that district. The movement in the North is looming up portentously, and is being watched with interest, as the League is making great efforts to conciliate the Orangemen and enlist them under one banner. They have made considerable progress, judging from the reports coming in every day of refusals to pay more than the Government valuation. The tenantry on Lord Lurgan's estate, having in view their landlord's refusal to reduce rents, have decided to pay no rents for the present. Sir Richard Wallace's tenants to-day drew up a long and earnest appeal for a fifty per cent. reduction. While denying all connections with the League, they express in firm and logical argument their inability to pay the present rents. The League meetings in various parts of the North are creating considerable excitement. They are not yet very large or important, but are making visible progress. A strong anti-League feeling is being aroused all over Ulster. County Down has been the first to act. A meeting of loyalists of each polling district of Down, "to consider the state of the country and what steps should be taken to counteract the action of the League," was held last evening in Belfast. A committee was appointed to carry out the determination arrived at, which is to hold opposition meetings wherever the League meetings are held.

The following resolution of the Grand Orange Lodge of Ireland, referring to the Down Anti-Land League, was read:—"The Grand Orange Lodge of Ireland heartily approves of the contemplated action of the loyalists of Down to counteract the working of the Land League, and earnestly recommends all true Orangemen to aid in the movement. Polling manifests to which are attached the names and addresses of upward of ten thousand persons, representing all classes, have been issued within two days to the loyal men of Down. We have up to the present watched with feelings of indignation the progress of the Land League organization, led by enemies of the British constitution and aiming at the dismemberment of the Empire. It damages every commercial interest, teaches the repudiation of contracts, blackens our country by those revolting outrages culminating in murder and crime which elude the grasp of justice and shake the fabric of our social system to its foundation. In a legal and constitutional manner we recently assembled to call upon the government to restore the supremacy of law; but the League continues to scatter its decrees and has now attempted to invade the province of Ulster. The time has now arrived when it becomes our solemn duty to rouse ourselves in defence of human life, in maintenance of the constitution and of civil and religious rights and liberties. You will be called upon, therefore, to assemble in your tens of thousands to repel the invasion of the apostles of anarchy, disloyalty and Communism, and also to take steps for holding a loyal meeting wherever a disloyal one takes place. Respond, then, when the call is made upon you. Let your manhood assert itself. Down expects her loyal sons to do their duty, and let her watchword be, 'Fear God and Honor the Queen.'"

Bismarck does not believe in geographical expeditions that do not yield political results.
