SPANIARDS WILL PROLONG THE WAR.

Hoping for Intervention.

HAVANA IS MORE STRONGLY FORTIFIED.

Spaniards want a Coaling Station in Mexico.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, May 23.—The Lafayette brings information of an expedition of Blanco Vera Cuez, for the purpose of endeavouring to secure coaling facilities etc., at Mex co.

Senator Arribard was a Lafayette passenger going to take the oath of office.

He is of opinion that the Spanish fleet is endeavoring to evade a meeting in order to prolong matters for the purpose of securing the intervention of the Powers.

It is intended by the Spanish, if the Americans attempt a landing, to force the Cubans to the front to bear the brunt of the American's fire.

The Spanish are having great difficulty in securing engineers for their vessels owing to the fact that foreigners holding such places are leaving in large numbers. There are stronger fortifications than ever at Havana Santa Clara and Vedado. The latter is a resort for the wealthy Spaniards.

HAVEN'T GOT HIM CORNERED YET.

Cervera Still at Large.

YANKEES FIND IT HARD TO CATCH HIM.

And Operations Have Come to a Standstill.

KEY WEST, May 23.—Speculation is still concentrated on the whereabouts of Admiral Cervera's squadron, the general opinion favoring some point on the southern Cuban coast.

As both sides of the Island are now patrolled by United States warships, the naval authorities will not admit the possibility of Cervera's escape.

Reports from Admiral Sampson's squadron say that all is quiet off the north coast of Cuba.

Nothing from Commodore Schley is expected before Tuesday.

A rumor has reached here that four American warships, while bombarding Santiago de Cuba, were driven off by the Spanish fleet, but the story is generally discredited.

AN INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION

For Canada and U. S.

SIR LOUIS DAVIES TO REPRESENT CANADA.

To Arrange the Details of a New Treaty.

WASHINGTON, May 23.—Negotiations will begin this week between the officials of the State Department and the British Ambassador and Sir Louis Davies, Canadian Minister of Marine, as the preliminary step towards a Convention or Treaty between United States and Great Britain clearing up the numerous long pending controversies between these countries.

Sir Louis Davies will arrive here on Tuesday.

It is not known who will be appointed on the British side. Sir Julian Pauncefote will be one of the commissioners and the other two will be Canadians, possibly Sir Richard Cartwright and Sir Louis Davies.

It is hoped that Sir Wilfrid Laurier himself may be able to act as one of the Canadian Commissioners.

The Commission may meet in Ottawa.

THE ANGLO-FRENCH COMPLICATIONS

Niger Difficulty Settled

FRANCE GIVES BOUSSA TO ENGLAND.

And Gets Nikki Herself—Mutual Concessions.

PARIS, May 23.—The Figaro publishes an important announcement that the delicate Niger question, which threatened to lead to an Anglo-French war, has been settled and that an agreement between the two Governments will be signed this week at the French origin office.

The agreement it is said will be satisfactory to both nations.

It involves mutual concessions, the chief being that the town Boussa which the French occupied but which the English claimed by earlier treaties, will be given to England while France will retain Nikki and two towns in the middle.

The importance of Boussa lies in fact that it is the highest town to which the river Niger is navigable.
