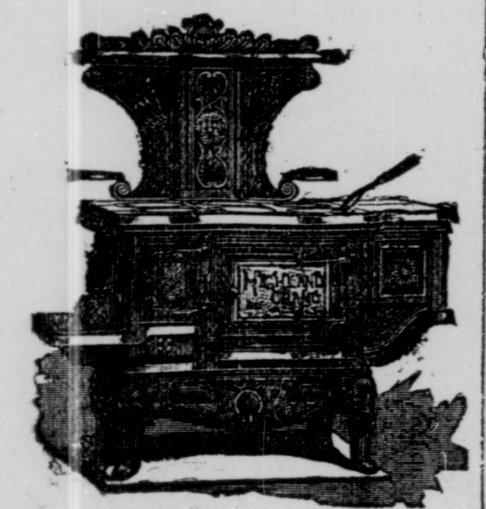

THE MEETING ON MONDAY

The public meeting to be held in
Market Hall on Monday evening will,
naturally, arrest the attention of all elec-
tors who care to hear public questions
well discussed. It is for Charlottetown
the first general meeting of the campaign.
We learn that it is the intention of Mr.
Stewart, the Opposition candidate, to re-
view the halting conduct of Sir Wilfrid
Laurier and his Government regarding
the sending of Canadian soldiers to South
Africa. As a number of "the boys" are
now on their way home to be crowned
with glory as a reward for the brave deeds
they have done for the Empire of which
we are all so proud, Mr. Stewart's speech
will be exceedingly interesting. That it
will also be an "eloquent and manly at-
tack upon an administration whose coun-
cils in this regard were divided, and
whose action was disgracefully slow, we
make no doubt. We only regret that Sir
Louis Davies is not able to accept the
plucky and cordial invitation to attend,
and history and reality, as well as he can,
to what Mr. Stewart may say.

By the way, we note that the Patriot
charges that, upon this point "the Con-
servatives have again resorted to cowardly
Bier methods of attack." It does not
appear that the Conservatives have laid
an ambush for Sir Louis or that en-
trenched behind their copies of truth, they
have sent out a party to lure Sir Louis to
his death while they lie waiting with
loaded rifles ready. No. The Conserva-
tives' action is fair and above board.
They have invited Sir Louis to the meet-
ing to defend Mr. Tarte and Sir Wilfrid
and their colleagues.

The Patriot seems to imagine that Sir
Louis is in his natural and proper position
—that is in opposition; and that it is his
duty to attack while the Conservatives
defend the Government citadel. But, for
the nonce—not for long—the positions
of the parties are reversed. The Liberal-
Conservatives now make the attack; the
Government and their supporters make
the best defence they can. It is a pity
that Sir Louis cannot avail himself of the
invitation that the Liberal-Conservatives
have courteously and cordially given him.
But he will, of course, have an oppor-
tunity, all to himself, to defend the Gov-
ernment upon a future occasion, and every

elector in Charlottetown ought to come to
the meeting on Monday night to hear Mr.
Stewart and other Opposition speakers
make the attack.

P. S.—We are informed by Patrick
Blake, Esq., President of the Liberal-
Conservative Association for West Queen's,
that it was he who made arrangements
for the meeting to be held in the Market
Hall on Monday evening and that he did
not know, at the time, that Sir Louis
Davies was engaged elsewhere on that even-
ing. In view of this fact, the Patriot's con-
tention that Sir Louis Davies was treated
with discourtesy, when cordially invited
to be present at the meeting, is the more
ridiculous. In any case, there could have
been no discourtesy in the invitation; and
everyone who knows Mr. Blake knows
that he is the last man to be discourteous
to Sir Louis or anyone else.

THE SAME ISSUE.

It is true, beyond all dispute, that the
attitude of the Liberals in England and in
Canada was almost identical regarding
the war in South Africa,—while Sir
Charles Tupper and his friends took pre-
cisely the same stand as that taken by
Lord Salisbury and his colleagues. If the
English Liberals had had their way,
there can be little doubt that some such
surrender would have been made to the
Boers as Gladstone made in 1880. If Sir
Wilfrid Laurier had had his way, Canada
would have done very little to strengthen
British influence in South Africa.

In the result of the British elections,
which have admittedly hinged on the war,
we can easily see what is the estimate of
our brethren on the other side of the At-
lantic regarding the sturdy patriotism of
Lord Salisbury, and the pusillanimity of
Harcourt and Morley. Do the people of
Canada place a lighter value on courage
and loyalty, or a weaker condemnation on
disloyalty, than do the great peoples from
whom we have sprung? We do not be-
lieve it. The issue in the Canadian elec-
tions, regarding the war, is practically the
same as in the British elections recently
held. We are the same people, and will
give the same verdict.

THE PROPOSED MONUMENT.

A meeting of citizens is to be held in
the City Council Chamber on Monday af-
ternoon at 4 o'clock, for the purpose of
taking action with reference to the pro-
posed monument in honor of the young
men of Prince Edward Island who volun-
teered for service in South Africa, and
who nobly fought at Paardeberg and
elsewhere. We understand that the
proposition is to erect something in Char-
lottetown, both ornamental and useful, as
a lasting memorial of the service rendered
by the brave volunteers of this province.
The living, as well as the dead, those
who escaped as well as those who fought
and fell, are to be remembered, and dis-
tinguished,—as they certainly deserve to
be. We hope that the meeting will in-
clude the more influential men of the com-
munity, and that such arrangements will
be made by the citizens as will ensure the
success of this patriotic movement.
