Student Election Turnout Called Largest In History

The largest number in the history of St. Dunstan's turned out to vote in the Students Union executive elections for next year. Eighty-four percent of the student body or approximately four hundred and sixty students cast their ballots last Tuesday.

The president-elect of the Students' Union is Charley McMillan, a Junior Arts student who polled some two hundred seventy-two votes. Runners-up were Tom McMillan who carried one hundred one, and Michael O'Brien who took eighty four votes.

For vice-president, Phillip MacDougall carried the banner with a hundred vote plurality over his only competition, Robert Hickey. For treasurer, Gerry Fraught fooled the Gallup poll by capturing a majority of twenty votes over his opponent, Brian Doran.

Class elections are to be held within seven days of the Students' Union elections according to the Students Union by-laws. This, in effect, means they will be held Monday or Tuesday of next week.

In the Amateur Athletic Association primaries John Rodgers led David MacDonald in the race for president and John Rowe led George Morrison for Secretary-Treasurer. These results are not final however for the individuals for these positions must be approved by the AAA executive.

North Gaspe Set For April

SOURIS — The M-V North Gaspe which travels from Picton, N.S., Charlottetown, Souris and the Magdalene Islands is scheduled to be in operation early in April.

The M-V North Gaspe who's Captain is Romeo Bourgeois has a crew of twenty-five. The boat is expected to call first in Souris around the middle of April.

The North Gaspe which is around by Clark Steamship Company, acts both as a freighter and also a means of travel for tourists for the Magdalene Islands. It usually calls at Souris four times a week and it carries an average of 14 cars per trip.

Plowing Team Leaves Early

Carl Willis, Sherwood and Edwin Mills, Bay Fortune will be in Chilliwack, British Columbia a week before they are to compete in the Canadian plowing championship meet. The Guardian has learned from Graeme Linkletter, Summerside, who is secretary of the P.E.I. Plowing Council which is looking after arrangements for the trip. The Islanders expect to arrive on the evening of April 13.

The Canadian championship will be contested on April 14 so that the Island plowmen will have a week to get their equipment tuned up and get some practice plowing done prior to the match.

The Islanders will likely compete in a visiting match on April 13, but the big event is on the following day. Each contestant plows a patch of stubble, and a patch of sod, and his work is scored on the basis of his performance in both cases. Raynall MacNeill, O'Leary will accompany the plowing team as manager and coach.

Annual Meeting Held Recently

TIGNISH — The 41st annual meeting of Tignish Fisheries Co-operative Association was held recently in the Legion Hall, Tignish, with chairman Hector Richard addressing a large attendance of 171 shareholders.

Wilson J. Shea, manager of the Fisheries Co-operative, reported on the growth of the fisheries, said growth has been steady and spectacular in recent years; this being the second year in succession that sales have had a yearly increase of over a quarter of a million dollars.

"We have passed the \$1,000,000 mark and very little fish products remained on hand at the close of the season," he said.

"The sale of salt fish is nearing a quarter of a million dollars and by the end of the year sales should increase to well over \$300,000."

The question of lobster trap limit and the limiting of fishing licences were discussed and recommendations and resolutions have been submitted from the Prince Edward Island Fisheries Federation. Public opinion seems to favor such a move, as 98 per cent of fishermen are in favor of a trap limit in Prince County.

Expanding business, the manager said, is forcing a change in the personnel and physical set up. Department heads need men with a good general knowledge of business who are prepared to spend the necessary time to educate and train themselves in their work.

In closing, the manager extended a warm word of thanks to members, employees and officials of government who are connected with the fishing industry.

The financial report, read by assistant manager Roy McLeod, indicated that progress passed the \$1,000,000 and wages during the year amounted to \$105,000.

Directors appointed to a three year term were Alvin Shea, Leo Richard and James Handrahan. Other directors include Claude Gavin, Jordan Ellsworth, J.W. Doucette, Roy Cormier, Alys Bernard and Hector Richard.

Milton Keough spoke on the welfare of the organization. Other speakers were: Very Rev. M.J. Rooney, Frank Arsenault, Terrance Gavin, Hubert Gaudet, Alfred McInnis and Hubert Cheverie, officer with the Department of Fisheries.

Lack Of Guidance Is Suggested

O'LEARY — There is possibly a lack of guidance by the Dominion Experimental Farm in handling the problem of blackleg in potatoes was one of the suggestions made at a Prince County Federation of Agriculture meeting recently in O'Leary. Following discussion a committee was appointed to bring a resolution before the meeting. Regarding a new potato plan announced Thursday by the Minister of Agriculture it was generally agreed that seed and tablestock go hand in hand.

Opposing a suggestion that less seed be grown an O'Leary dealer said the industry is at present unable to supply seed in the sizes demanded but if all farmers grew seed they would be unable to market it. The same dealer considered that blackleg could be controlled by good management.

Rudy Dallenbach, department Prince County discussed farm business, community schools such as are already underway in Mount Stewart and Kensington.

About seventy-five farmers attended the meeting which was presided over by the president for Prince County, Borden Grennan.

Art Exhibitions Are Scheduled

Special exhibitions are scheduled for the Confederation Centre Gallery as a part of the nine week Summer Festival of the Arts. The announcement was made by Confederation Centre Gallery Director Moncrieff Williamson. The festival is scheduled to begin July 4.

Two major exhibitions and a special selection of works from the permanent Robert Harris collection will be offered during the Festival's nine week run. The major exhibition will be "The Royal Academy in Retrospect", a collection of work dating back over a three year period and including 75 major paintings by Academicians and Associate Academicians.

The paintings will be on view from July 1. It is anticipated that the show will be officially opened by Prince Edward Island's Lieutenant Governor, the Honorable W.J. MacDonald scheduled for July 5. Academy President Harold Beament and Vice-President A.T. Galt Dufford will attend the Charlottetown opening.

The second major exhibition, a collection of photographs by Roloff Beny, opens the last part of July for a six week stay. The exhibition also includes textiles based on photographic prints and is reported to include much of Beny's finest work. Confederation Centre is one of the five Canadian galleries to offer the exhibition during 1966.

The third summer offering, a selection of the works of Robert Harris from the gallery's permanent collection, will offer a counterpoint to the other two exhibitions. Harris, best known as the painter of the Fathers of Confederation, was Canada's leading portraitist in the late 19th century and the first president of the Canadian Academy.

Included in the 1966 selection will be a number of works which will go into the special Centennial Collection now being planned for a nation-wide tour as part of Confederation Centre's contribution to Centennial celebrations.

In addition to the major exhibitions, a new Children's Gallery and Museum will be ready for the summer influx of visitors. It will feature displays of special interest to the younger set, as well as examples of work produced by Prince Edward Island youngsters during winter-long art classes at the Centre.

Regular Meeting Staged Recently

The regular monthly meeting of the provincial executive of the Prince Edward Island Federation of Home and School Association was held recently with the president Mrs. Stewart MacDonald presiding. Plans for the semi-annual meeting to be held at the Provincial Vocational Institute Monday, March 28th, at 2:30 p.m. were discussed. Theme for the meeting is "secondary education". Rev. Edmond Roche, C. Dunstons University, will give the keynote address: are our high schools obsolete?

This will be followed by discussion groups. Mr. Jack Sands, National President of Home and Schools will address the meeting. Dinner will be served from 6-7 p.m.

The evening session which begins at 7:15 will have as its theme "education and the great society." A fifteen minute film pertinent to the theme will be shown. This will be followed by a panel discussion. Panel members will be Charles Campbell, Chairman, Jack Sands, Mrs. Marjorie Dover, Dr. John Maloney, and Thomas Hall.
