

Giants In 6-2 Victory Over Cincinnati Reds

New York Giants hit freely behind Jim Hearn Monday and the steady right-hander pitched his 10th win of the season, a 6-2 victory over Cincinnati Reds.

The Giants moved to within five games of the league-leading Brooklyn Dodgers, but how long they would remain there depended on the outcome of a night Dodge-St. Louis Cardinal tilt in Sportsman's Park. The Philadelphia Phillies - Chicago Cubs game was rained out, while Boston Braves and Pittsburgh Pirates were not scheduled.

In the American League, the second division clubs had a field day.

The last-place Detroit Tigers hauled off to thump the front-running New York Yankees 8-2. Washington Senators, in fifth place, routed the runner-up Cleveland Indians 10-1. The seventh-place Browns took Boston Red Sox 7-5.

Chicago White Sox were at Philadelphia for an arc light contest.

The Giants belted four Red pitchers for 11 singles and four doubles with Bobby Thomson getting four for five, including three two-baggers.

Hearn, however, needed all the help he could get. He gave up at least one hit in seven of the nine innings, but his mates came to his rescue with double plays in both the first and second frames. The Reds left 10 runners stranded.

Billy Hoeltz, a 20-year-old left-

hander, was the Yankees' nemesis as he held the New Yorkers to two runs for the first seven innings before wittingly in the 9th-degree heat while base running in the eighth. Hal White finished up and pitched two scoreless innings.

First inning errors by Billy Martin and Yogi Berra helped get the Tigers off to a 3-0 lead. They added one in the sixth and four in the eighth. Hoeltz was in trouble several times but had it in the pinches. The Yanks left 15 runners on bases.

Five Cleveland errors and nine bases on balls made it easy for Washington. The Senators collected 13 hits off four Indian hurlers. Jackie Jensen homered for the sixth time this season as Sandy Cosuegra beat Sam Jones.

Rookie Dave Madison had a shut-out until the ninth, but the heat got him like it did Hoeltz, and the Red Sox put over all of their five runs before reliever Earl Harris got the side out. The Browns knocked out starter Ray Scarborough with a five-run first and added singletons in the third and fifth.

Dave Philley's fourth hit, a 10th-inning single, scored Eddie Joost to give Philadelphia Athletics a 2-1 victory over Chicago White Sox in a game played under the lights. Philley also batted in the Athletics' first run with a triple in the first inning.

Chicago tied it up in the eighth when the A's starter, Harry Byrd, yielded a walk and two hits for a run.

New Glasgow's Freddie Wilson lost a six-round decision to Maritime light-heavyweight champion Archie "Bear" Hannigan.

The forgotten man of sport in the City could very well be the tennis player. Possibly the least publicized would be a better way of describing the tennis player or players for it is a fact that very little ink has been spread towards them this year. The reason of course is that there have been no tennis tournaments about which a sportswriter or others interested could twist together a story. But despite the lack of tournaments, it is a fact that the tennis players have been quite active during the past few months.

It should be pointed out that tennis is a sport that does exist entirely on tournaments although there is no doubt that tournaments stimulate interest in the game. The greatest good for the greatest number of the players is obtained in the everyday games between the club members. That this greatest good is being obtained can be evidenced on a visit to the courts on any fine evening, Wednesday, Saturday and Sunday afternoons.

The courts this year are being cared for by a young fellow who recently gained some prominence in baseball, Ian "Weasel" Kennedy. Allan MacDonald, the Saint Dunstan's football and debating star looked after the courts for the first part of the summer but Alan recently resigned to finish the summer working in another capacity. The courts, especially the three on the north end are in excellent shape, and work is being carried out on the other three to put them into equally as good a condition.

In our books it is not necessary to have a group of star players in order to make a success of any amateur athletic adventure. All that is necessary is a group of competent players with the necessary determination to play the game to the best of their ability and the will to make it possible for themselves to play. That, we believe, is what the tennis players at the local courts have been doing for the past few years. True there may be players around of the stature of the pre-war performers but that does not necessarily mean that the game is on the decline.

As a matter of fact we might say that the game is almost as healthy as it ever was. We believe that most of those playing tennis these week-day evenings are getting as much enjoyment and recreation out of tennis as any other group of players anywhere. And that we think is the prime object of amateur sport—recreation and enjoyment for a person after a day's work.

Speaking of work and effort it is probably quite safe to say that the local tennis players have put as much elbow-grease into getting the courts in condition this year as any other group of athletes. To begin with the winter storms kayoed one of the fences on the back of the courts and the cost of reconstructing this fence was not a small figure. The money, it must be remembered comes from the players themselves and not from outside contributors.

Considering tournaments for a few moments it is probably safe to say that there will be Club and Provincial tournaments on the local courts. It is certain that it will likely be starting around the last of July or the first of August. In other areas there have been provincial tournaments and it is likely that there will be one this year.

Four teams will see action in the City Softball League this evening with the spotlight shining on the Parkdale Diamond where the Basilica Youth Club will play the Sunshine Island Dairy nine. The dairymen lead the league with 14 points followed by the B.Y.C. with 13. This evening's game will be a battle for first place and it is probable that the team which wins this evening will win the league. Following the games there will be an executive meeting at the Holy Name Hall to consider the argument between Horne Motors and Maritime Electric over one of last week's games. This meeting will be at eight o'clock.

A problem facing the Island Baseball League will be that dealing with Holman's Intermediates and the points they have won or lost in the league. Holman's, who quit the league Sunday, have won only six points but they have lost quite a few. The question now arises should all the Holman's games be thrown out or should they be counted and each team given points for the remainder of the Holman's games in the schedule. It is understood a league meeting will be held this evening to consider drafting a new schedule.

Earl Hennessey, second baseman of the office and George Nelson, shed first sacker turned in outstanding games in the field for their respective teams.

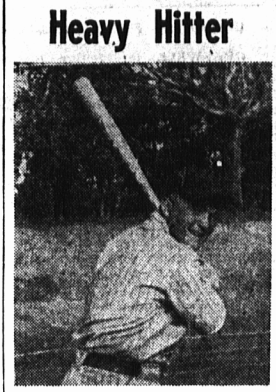

Construction Of Tri-Service Hospital Urged

OTTAWA, July 14—(CP)—Construction of a tri-service hospital in Ottawa as a step towards greater integration of medical services of the three forces for peace and war.

The report of the four-man committee, headed by Dr. G. E. Hall, president of the University of Western Ontario, London, Ont., was presented to Defence Headquarters recently and has been under study at various levels, including that of Defence Minister Claxton and the Chiefs of Staff.

While this headquarters study is going on, not much is being said publicly about the report.

The committee which prepared it was named late last year to look into the possibility of greater integration of the nursing and medical services of the three forces for peace and war.

The report is understood to see a tri-service hospital in the capital as the start of a program of getting personnel of the three forces working together in what would be not only a hospital but a training ground.

Eventual establishment of other tri-service hospitals elsewhere in the country also is believed to figure in the recommendations.

Military hospitals now are operated by one service which, however, does not prevent men of other services being treated there. Thus, for instance, the R. C. A. F. hospital at Rockcliffe Airport is manned by Air Force doctors and nurses but is also used for treatment of soldiers and sailors stationed in the Ottawa area.

150 Entries For Canadian Golf Championship

WINNIPEG, July 14—(CP)—The straight hitters will be the men to beat in the four-day Canadian open golf championship, which opens Wednesday.

Roughly two-thirds of the 150 entries checked in today and tuned up for the 72-hole medal play test over the deceptive championship layout of the St. Charles Golf and Country Club.

Many had trouble with traps running most of the greens, and with the trees lining the narrow fairways.

Consensus of the players was that the long-ball hitters and chance-takers may get into trouble on the comparatively short course—6,215 yards—which is made to order for the fellows who are accurate off the tee and can take full advantage of the true-putting greens.

Forecasts of the score likely to carry off the \$3,000 first prize in the \$15,000 tournament ranged all the way from 270, 18 under par for the 72 holes. About midway between—274 to 276—would seem to be a good guess. Defending champion Jim Ferrier shot a 273 over Toronto Mississauga to capture the 1951 championship and the record for the event is 268 shot by Bobby Locke over Toronto Scarborough's par-71 layout in 1947. St. Charles par is 72.

Ferrier, out for his third straight Canadian title, was expected tomorrow. So were two other former Canadian champions—Dutch Harrison who won in 1949 and Lawson Little who won in 1936.

The Canadian pros, who played their own Professional Golfers Association championship over the Niakwa course here last week, had little hope of dislodging the American entries from their grasp on the Canadian open. Last Canadian winner was Karl Kaffer of Ottawa in 1914. Last Canadian to finish second was Ben Gray of Toronto Scarborough in 1941. Gray is an entry in this year's event.

Stan Leonard of Vancouver Marine Drive, Canada's best competitive golfer in recent years, clipped four strokes off par with a practice round of 68 today.

Gordon Brydson of Toronto Mississauga made it in 70. Most of the Canadian pros were around or over par and some concentrated on practice shots. Pat Fletcher of Saskatoon, new Canadian P. G. A. champion, was over par by two strokes.
