A Pyrrhic Victory for the Tories.

Dissolution Postponed

Newfoundland Question to be Settled.

TYLER AND TUPPER.

LONDON, May 9.

At the election on Thursday in South Dorset the Tory candidate defeated the Gladstonian by only forty. The Liberals polled 752 more votes than at the last election, and the Tories 199 less.

A cabinet council was held yesterday. It discussed the Newfoundland question and the question of the dissolution of parliament. The by-elections have dispelled the idea that the Government is sure of a large majority, and it is ascertained that the ministry have decided against an early dissolution. The present parliament may sit till late in the autumn.

Lord Knutsford, after yesterday's council, resumed communications with the Newfoundland delegates. The delegates' draft of amendment to Lord Knutsford's bill was opposed by the cabinet, and Lord Knutsford's reply to the delegates' memorial will enable the colonial legislature to pass the proposed Act before the Whitsunday recess, and thus allow the Government to drop the obnoxious bill.

The formal expulsion of Captain Verney and Dr. Cobain from the House of Commons will take place at an early date. It is said that the recent scandals involves seven members of the Commons in the disgrace, not including several who escaped exposure, although their cases were widely talked about.

Lord Salisbury consents to short extension modus vivendi with Portugal relating to South Africa.

Sir Charles Tupper had another letter in yesterday's Times. He asserts that Tyler's mismanagement is fatal to all who are unwilling to accept semi-anarchical abuse of the Canadian Government instead of dividends, reiterates his charges against Tyler of ordering the Grand Trunk officials to actively oppose the Government at last election, and adduces letters in proof.

LONDON, May 9.

The Dominion surplus for the ten months of the present financial year is over six millions.

A new contract was arranged with the Dominion and Allan Lines of steamships on Thursday last for the carriage of the mails. Both steamship companies have accepted the Government's terms.

MONTREAL, May 9.

In Montreal last night, despite the opposition of the clergy, the Parnellite meeting was well attended by an enthusiastic crowd. Redmond was greeted with prolonged applause. He spoke for an hour and a half, and was followed by O'Kelly. The meeting is regarded as a success. They speak in Ottawa next Wednesday evening.

The Times, in an editorial on the Behring Sea question, says that Blaine's important concessions make arbitration possible.

Twenty-six members of the British House of Commons are attacked with influenza. Lord Knutsford has been ordered a complete rest. The epidemic is spreading rapidly in Liverpool and Dublin.

Italian Indignation and Emigration.

ROME, May 9.

The Italian press is indignant over the report of the New Orleans Grand Jury. One paper says that it will be impossible hereafter for any civilized country to make a treaty with the United States based upon a reciprocity in the protection of the lives of citizens of either country.

Fourteen hundred emigrants left Naples yesterday for New York.
