Housing Assistance Requested By Town

Representatives of the town of Georgetown asked the provincial government to give assistance in providing housing for the large number of employees that will be working in the new Georgetown industries. The assistance request was formally presented to the Cabinet yesterday morning.

The delegation asked the government to give consideration to the introduction of legislation, or amendment to present legislation, which would enable the department of municipal affairs to enter into an agreement with municipalities, providing assistance in solving housing problems.

Members of the delegation were Mayor H.S. MacLean, deputy mayor Waldron Lavers, councillor John P. MacDonald, T.W. Sanderson and W.E. Bennett, general manager and secretary, respectively, of Bathurst Marine Limited; Einar Munch-Ellingsen, general manager of Gulf Garden Foods Limited; and Rev. L.B. Dooley and C.N. Mair, executive members of the Georgetown resources development group.

LOW BRACKET
The delegation said 80 per cent of the housing need will be in the low-cost housing bracket, with a rent ceiling of approximately \$60 to \$65 per month. It is estimated that 50 dwellings will be needed by June and another 50 by September. It is pointed out that the dwellings can be located on land available at no cost to the town, through the P. E. I. Industrial Corporation.

In its submission, the delegation said that Bathurst Marine Limited is now employing 120 people and expects a payroll of 200 in August, while Gulf Garden Foods Limited, expected to employ 120 by the end of the year, will employ about 350 by the summer of 1966.

Pointing out that the companies have begun a housing program for their senior staffs, the delegation said that "no other developments have taken place and no present facilities exist to accommodate the need arising from the advent of the two industries."

GOOD LOCATION
The 100 housing units, suggested as a target for September, can, according to the delegation, be located in an area where land is available at no cost to the town. The dwellings could be located adjacent to the main water line to the food processing plant and dwellings could be connected with gravity flow lines to the sewage plant provided by the Atlantic Development Board.

It was emphasized in the submission that the town "cannot immediately participate in such a low cost housing program in the manner required by Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation." The cabinet was told that "over a 10-month period, the housing problem was studied and all available advice received. This joint representation is the result of work of the resources development committee which has looked into the matter thoroughly."

Dr. M.L. Bonnell, opposition leader, suggested the members be given the time to examine the tabulated documents. "Now that the minister has co-operated in supplying the vouchers, we should co-operate with him by studying them. It is only fair that we study the vouchers to clear the minister."

Foreign Control Of Industry Increased In Canada In 1961

OTTAWA (CP) — Foreign control of a wide section of Canadian industry grew in 1962 but it was less concentrated in the United States, the bureau of statistics reported. Its annual review showed that non-resident control of the petroleum and natural gas industry in Canada rose to 74 per cent in 1962, two percentage points higher than in 1961. Non-resident control of manufacturing in Canada rose one percentage point to 60 per cent. In mining and smelting, it dropped two percentage points to 57. With smaller non-resident control of Canadian railways and other utilities—two and four per cent, in 1962—the bureau's report showed over-all non-resident control of the listed industries and merchandising up one percentage point to 34 per cent. That J.S. control of petroleum and natural gas dropped one percentage point to 62 per cent, and in the mining and smelting industry of Canada, it dropped 0.51 per cent compared with 61 in 1961.

Khushchev Interview Called Fake

MOSCOW (AP) — A spokesman for the Soviet foreign ministry said here a recent interview with Khushchev, reported by a French journalist, was not genuine. The journalist quoted the former Soviet premier as advising Soviet caution in Southeast Asia. "I heard about this claimed interview 10 days ago," the foreign ministry spokesman said. "It was offered to a news agency and was turned down. That's all I know." Asked twice whether the interview was genuine, he replied both times, "of course not." In Paris, journalist Pierre Jeancard said he had no reason to doubt the authenticity of written answers he received to questions he addressed to Khushchev. Jeancard said he sent a list of questions to Khushchev last December along with a Christmas card. Receiving no answer, he made a new approach to Khushchev Feb. 21 through a French official, who returned with answers, Jeancard said. The answers were signed in European characters with Khushchev's name. On the first page were the initials "NSK."

CN Railways Introduce Container

Canadian National Railways are introducing a new type of road-rail container to speed the movement of express freight traffic between the Maritimes and Montreal.

These 20-foot-long containers, known as railtrailers, are insulated and have built-in heating units. They are coming into service this week.

A big advantage of the containers is that they can be transferred easily from train to truck, eliminating unnecessary handling of shipments and speeding pick-up and delivery. On the train the containers ride on specially-adapted flatcars.

Hydraulic arms on the truck reach under the containers, and pull them sideways to the truck body. Within minutes the truck is ready to deliver the contents of the containers. The train, from which no cars have to be
