**BUTTER.**

The news that P. E. Island butter, ex Lake Winnipeg, has been sold in Liverpool at 98s and 100s, per cwt. is encouraging to our dairymen. It is to be noted that the price is very near the top of the market for the Colonial product, and that whether butter goes up or butter goes down, we can obtain the higher figure, if only our factorymen take care to maintain the character of their product by keeping up its quality. It has been well said by Professor Robertson that the activity and extent of the demand for perishable food products depend very largely upon the excellence of the quality and relative highness or cheapness of price. Retail merchants state that when a family uses fresh-made creamery butter during the winter, the total quantity of butter consumed is more than twice larger than when the same family purchased only a good quality of autumn-made butter held over during the winter, as it used to be, in cellars and other unsuitable places. When Canadian creamery butter, Canadian turkeys, Canadian tender fruits and Canadian eggs are delivered in Great Britain through the use of cold storage conveniences in a perfectly preserved condition, the increased demand which they will create for themselves will more than equal the capacity of the Canadian farmers to increase the production of these things. It is to be hoped also that by that means a large class of consumers of relatively high priced foods will prefer Canadian products to all others, and thus there will be returned to Canada a fair proportion of the price paid by the wealthy classes there for very dainty products. Then such preservation of the quality of products will lead to such increased production that there will be a very rapid and great extension of the export trade. As an instance of what has already resulted largely from the cold storage service, which was provided in even a primitive way on steamships for the season of 1895, it may be cited that the total exports of butter from Montreal during the season of navigation, have been as follows:—

1894.....	32 055 packages
1895.....	65 664 "
1896.....	107,321 "
1897.....	220,200 "

This statement shows the upward tendency of the Canadian butter trade, now that butter of high quality is being shipped, fresh, to the British markets. The state of the market in England is set forth in the last London correspondence of the Montreal Price Current, as follows:—

Canada has certainly reason to be proud of the position she has won in our butter market. This week things have been decidedly a quiet cast, with prices in most directions tending downward, yet Canadian has kept steady at unchanged quotations. Danish has been liberal supply, and prices should have gone down farther than they have. The official quotation, however, remains unchanged, and agents have not made many concessions. Buyers have consequently left it alone. There is plenty of Antipodean to turn to, and a superfluity of Canadian as well. Thus do the mighty Danes defeat themselves. They will have to come down presently; but meanwhile, they have added value to Canadian, which otherwise must have dropped. All landings there are of excellent quality, and the quotations run the Australian product very close. Finest is fixed at 9s to 10s; good to fine 9s to 9s; inferior 7s to 8s. The extreme range of Australian is 9s to 10s. Argentina is out of the market this season on drought. I should

not be surprised to see a decent sized drop next week or the week after, as Colonial arrivals are accumulating, and a big shipment is due."

Here we have the intimation that Canadian butter has won a high position and is still gaining favor in England on account of its improved quality. We hope that every butter maker and factory patron in this Province will strive to produce a first-class, g. l. edge, quality of butter for shipment abroad and for use at home.

**NEWS NOTES.**

Mr Pullman's inc has been fixed at \$90,000 a month,—poor thing.

Le Roi mine in British Columbia has been purchased by the British American corporation.

The total amount of money expended for charity last year by organized charities in the State of New York was \$23,100,80.

Over sixteen thousand dollars have been spent by the public works department this year in the improvement of the navigation of the St. Lawrence river. Next year Hon. Mr. Tarte proposes to spend considerably more.

There is a probability that Mr. Roberts, the new Mormon Congressman from Utah, will find his three wives in the way when he seeks to take his seat. There is a prejudice in the east of the United States against a man having three wives alive unless he is divorced from two of them.
