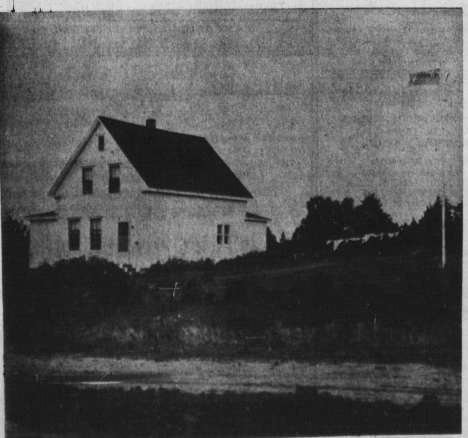
MR. AND MRS. WINSTON WOOD, MT. HERBERT

SDU President Leaves For N.S., Ottawa Meetings

Very Rev. G. A. Macdonald, president of St. Dunstan's University, left yesterday for Halifax where he attended a reception and dinner last night at which members of the Bladen Commission were hosted by the Association of Atlantic Universities.

The Maritime university presidents are meeting this afternoon with members of the commission to summarize the position of the AAU on the question of financing higher education with particular reference to the Atlantic Provinces.

This afternoon Father Macdonald will travel to Acadia University in Wolfville, N.S. for the formal installation of Dr. J. M. R. Beveridge as president.

From Wolfville, the SDU president will travel to Ottawa for the annual meeting of the National Conference of Canadian Universities and Colleges being held at the Chateau Laurier from Oct. 26-29.

One of the principal items to be discussed at the NCUU meetings will be the year-round operation of universities in Canada.

While in Ottawa, Father Macdonald will also attend a special convocation exercises at the University of Ottawa at which Very Rev. Roger Guindon, OMI, will be installed as president.

Queens Co. Jail Escapees Sentenced To Dorchester

Three men who escaped from Queen's County Jail by sawing through bars on the second floor late Monday afternoon and were apprehended by RCMP in the Port Elgin, N.B. area about midnight Monday, appeared in Queen County Magistrate's Court Friday and were sentenced to terms in Dorchester Penitentiary on charges of unlawfully escaping from custody.

The sentences were meted out by Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C.

Two of the escapees, Andrew Alphonse Arsenault, 19, of Abram's Village, and Thomas Henry Bristol, 23, of Liverpool, N.S. each received two-year

sentences. The third of the trio, Francis Martell, 17 of New Waterford, N.S., was given one year in Dorchester.

The three escapees, escorted by two members of the RCMP were brought court in handcuffs, later removed.

Arsenault and Bristol had pleaded guilty to a charge of Wednesday, when they were remanded to Friday for sentencing.

ADDITIONAL 30 DAYS

Bristol in addition Friday pleaded guilty to a charge of joyriding, after a charge of theft was withdrawn by Crown Prosecutor Alan K. Seales, and was sentenced to 30 days to run concurrently with the penitentiary term. The joyriding charge, laid by Parkdale Police, arose from the theft of a car on or about Oct. 13 from the S. R. Johnston lot near Parkdale.

Martell also was sentenced to 30 days on a charge of car theft, the sentence to run concurrently. The charge was laid by RCMP.

At the time of their escape from jail, Arsenault was in custody under a lieutenant-governor's warrant for murder; Bristol was serving time for impaired driving; Martell was in custody for theft.

All three remained impressive when sentenced to Dorchester by Magistrate Johnston, Friday.

RCMP told the court that

Bristol had a police record involving a variety of offences dating back to 1954.

All three of the accused, before sentence was passed, were asked if they had anything to say by Magistrate Johnston.

ASKED FOR DORCHESTER

Arsenault and Bristol each said they had nothing to say. Martell asked to be sent to Dorchester.

In sentencing Martell, Magistrate Johnston said he was "taking into account Martell's 'excellent youth.' The magistrate said he hoped Martell would watch his behavior in future."

Arsenault, Bristol and Martell escaped from jail about 5.30 p.m. Monday. They were apprehended by RCMP at 11.45 p.m. the same night in the Port Elgin, N.B. area, and were returned shortly after to Queen's County Jail.

RCMP received the report of the break about 9.30 p.m. and immediately set up road blocks as part of an effort to return the escapees to custody.

The trio did not have legal counsel when they appeared for sentencing Friday.

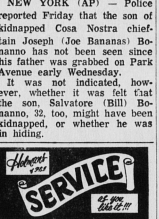
