IN AND AROUND TORONTO.

A Look at a Famous Bacon Curing Establishment and a Noted Farm.

(Special Correspondence of THE EXAMINER.)

On our way back from the Fat Stock Show, we spent a day in Toronto, and took in some of the sights, paying particular attention to those that were of especial interest to farmers.

In Guelph we had the pleasure of meeting Mr. Flavelle, manager of the William Davis Packing Co.,—the largest curers of bacon in Canada—and though Mr. F. W. Hodson had arranged with him to be shown through their factory. Accordingly about 25 of the maritime men, in company with Mr. Hodson, were shown the whole process of selecting, killing, curing, inspecting and packing Wiltshire bacon for the English market.

We were first shown the process of selecting the hogs in the pens. We found in one large enclosure some hundreds of mixed hogs. Between this enclosure and two other large pens was a long narrow track about a foot wide so that the pigs could only pass one at a time, following each other closely. At the end of the narrow passage the culer's ood with a lever in his hand with which he opened one gate and closed another at will. When a suitable bacon came he was shunted into one department, and when a fat one came he went to another.

From this the hogs were taken up to the killing room where they are handled at the rate of 3,000 in ten hours. After being dressed those suitable for the best brands of bacon go on a track to the sinner and are drawn up through a flame which flavors and colors them slightly. This is how they get the name of "Singed Wiltshire Canadian" in the English market, and this brand brings 10 to 12 shillings more than bacon made from fat hogs. The hogs that will not do for this grade of meat pass along on rails to the cold room where they are cut up and go to the salters on another floor.

On the salting floors we saw thousands of sides placed in immense piles in different stages of curing. They then go to another department where they receive the brand of the firm after they have passed the first inspection.

They are again inspected on another floor to detect if any soft sides should be among them, and if any are found they are put aside and the brand cleaned off them, as this final inspector's work is to see that only first-class goods go to market with the brand of the firm on them.

This firm makes a specialty of putting up Wiltshire bacon, and the manager informed us that as soon as it was properly cured it had to go to market at once no matter what the prices were as it would lose in quality if kept. They also put up an immense amount of sausages, using the shoulders of the heavy hogs for that purpose. Each person in the party was presented with a pound box of their sausages

as a Christmas present. This establishment puts up 75 tons of fertilizer per month, principally blood and bone, which is shipped to American firms to be further prepared for use in agriculture. About 450 men were employed by this concern at the time of our visit.

While here the farmers of our party got a better idea than they ever had before of the kind of hog that was wanted to make the best class of bacon. We saw all kinds and qualities of porkers. But we noticed that the ones selected for Wiltshire bacon were lengthy and not nearly so fat as hogs marketed in Charlottetown.

From this the party went, the guests of Walter E. H. Massey, the head of the Massey-Harris manufacturing business, to see his farm in the suburbs of Toronto, seven miles from the city. Mr. Massey provided a street car for us which took us out six miles, where his farm horse team met us and landed us at

a spot that can hardly be excelled for beauty. Here we found everything on a magnificent scale. The first building we inspected was the hen house, about 150 feet long and cut out of the side of a hill, having a southern exposure and the bank at the back level with the top of it. It was an ideal house, with its large windows and roomy, clean pens divided by with netting. Here was about every kind of hen known. The house was two stories, the roosts and nest boxes above and the scratching pens below.

We were then shown the trout hatchery where large numbers of trout fry are hatched out. The trout ponds were very fine and are well stocked with brook trout. Some of the specimens we saw were of good size.

But the great business here is the production of pure milk. A herd of sixty-six milch cows are kept in extensive and up-to-date barns. Milk production here is conducted on the most thorough, scientific and sanitary principles. The milk after it is drawn from the cow is cooled and aerated by passing through an aerator that cools it by contact with ice. It is then sterilized by heating it to 150 or 160 degrees, after which it is bottled and sold in the city for 11 cents a quart. It is bought by people who value pure milk for their children.

The barn is heated with steam and lighted with electricity by an electrical power plant on the place. The stables are kept scrupulously clean and the manure carried over a hundred yards to a manure tank by means of large buckets that run on rail.

The clothes of the milkmen and the milking stools are all sterilized every day by having hot steam turned on them in a close room. A veterinary surgeon is constantly employed to look after the health of the cattle, and a medical doctor looks after the health of the men and keeps a record of any case of sickness. No man who is not in good health is allowed to work among the cattle.

All cattle that are purchased are tested with tuberculin before being admitted and are tested at intervals afterwards. The cattle barn is built on a hillside and is arranged so that teams can be driven into the four floors from a ground level. There is a good stable of work horses kept for farm use.

About 40 acres of the farm was in corn last season, which was cured in two enormous silos.

There are two very fine residences on the place belonging to Mr. W. H. Massey and his brother.

This is certainly an ideal dairy farm and the conditions under which milk is produced here are a safeguard to Mr. Massey's customers.

The cattle are most all high-class Jerseys, many of them imported

direct from their native isle. Among other animals in the bull stable we were shown the first prize winner at the Toronto Industrial.

Most of the rest of our time in Toronto was taken up with an inspection of the Parliament buildings where we were shown the sights by Hon. John Dryden. Of our visit to Ottawa and the Experimental Farm we may speak later.
