Will Celebrate 50th Anniversary Of Ordination

Rev. John MacKinnon of Chesley, Ontario, is this month celebrating the fiftieth anniversary of his ordination to the Christian ministry. Due recognition of this fact was made in the recent meeting of the United Church Presbytery of Bruce in Port Elgin, by congratulations and felicitations, and also by a tangible evidence of goodwill in the gift of a beautiful piece of silver to Mr. MacKinnon and a bouquet of roses to Mrs. MacKinnon.

Mr. MacKinnon was born in Heatherdale, Prince Edward Island in 1861, and was the youngest son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William MacKinnon of that place. He received his early education in the local schools and in the Prince of Wales College in Charlottetown, after winning one of the six government scholarships awarded by the province at that time. In 1882 he entered Queen's University, Kingston, and graduated in 1886 with first class honors in Mathematics and was the valedictorian of his class. A much coveted honor in those days. In 1889 he graduated in Theology, receiving the degrees of B.D. and M.A. After graduation he offered himself for two years' service under the Home Mission Board, and was ordained by the Presbytery of Kingston on June 6th, 1889. Mr. MacKinnon served for thirty-five continuous years in four Ontario churches of the Presbyterian Church and had the satisfaction of seeing goodly progress in them all, especially in increasing interest and liberality in the missionary work of the church. He resigned from the active work in 1923 on account of serious eye trouble, and retired to Chesley where he has since resided.

Mrs. MacKinnon is the daughter of the late John White, who represented East Hastings in the House of Commons for about twenty years. She has been an efficient helpmeet during all the years.

Their son, Rev. John W. MacKinnon, M.A., B.D., served three years in France during the Great War. After five years of ministerial service in Western Canada he passed his reward in 1930, at the age of thirty-three. Their daughter, Ruth, is the wife of Dr. J. L. McKelvey, now head of the Ophthalmic Department in the University of Minnesota, in Minneapolis.—(Chesley Enterprise).
