

The Brien Keil Hambletonian Entry

DU QUON, ILL. (CP) — The rich Hambletonian trot set for the 28th annual State Fair Aug. 28-30 has a field of 20 possible starters Wednesday.

As things stand now, a Prince Edward Islander will be at the reins of one entry in the race for a gross purse of about \$127,485 with a winner's purse of \$68,714.

Joe O'Brien, 45, of Alberton, P.E.I., and Shafter, Calif., already has two Hambletonians in his credit: 1953 with Scott and in 1959 with Black Hanover.

It was in 1960 that O'Brien drove Black Hanover to the richest Hambletonian ever, with a gross pot of \$144,500.

This year O'Brien is down to drive either Laurita Hanover or Safe Mission.

He was the leading grand circuit driver in 1958 and 1959 and third in the grand circuit in 1957 and 1961. He was the top driver in 1960 under the universal driver rating system which has 25 grades.

O'Brien was third - leading money winner of North America in 1959 and 1959, 11th in 1960 and 10th in 1961.

whose winnings total \$1,485,819 in the five years spanning 1957-61.

One of the big gigs will have to be arsed this year's Spry Rodney, Arnold Handor's 4-year-old, turning the mile in 2:12.4.

If this year's Hambletonian draws 20 or fewer starters, it will be run on a straight basis of two-three-hats basis.

Should the field be larger than 20, it will be run on an elimination heat basis with entries divided by lot. The first five finishers in the first division would meet the first five in the second division in a third heat.

Should one of the first two winners also win the third heat, he would become Hambletonian champ. Should a third horse win the third heat, the three winners would return for a final race-off.

Doug Harvey Will Report To N.Y. Club Young Ones Perform

MONTRÉAL (CP) — Doug Harvey said Wednesday night he will report to New York Rangers National Hockey League training camp in Vancouver this season.

The all-star defenseman and Rangers playing-coach last year said he had not signed a contract with the New York club. He refused to say how much the Rangers offered him but he believed to be about \$300,000.

"I didn't have a solid contract with the Rangers and I haven't signed one yet this year," Doug Harvey said.

The perennial all-star defenseman was named as playing-coach of the Rangers after the 1961-62 season. He said that he was unwilling to move his family to New York.

He said Wednesday night the offer from the Rangers would allow him to spend time because of his family in Montreal. He would not coach.

The gate, the crowd, the number of competitors will make many of these baby trotters and pacers real jittery and they'll do things that will ruin their chances of coping their respective stables.
