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Contract Bridge

A CLOSE QUESTION
A correspondent asks for an opinion concerning a play made by his partner in a match-point duplicate game. The deal was:
South dealer.
Both sides vulnerable.
♠ J 8 4
♥ 8 7 4 2
♦ K J
♣ K Q 9 8
♠ 9 6 2
♥ A J 10
♦ 10 9 8 6
♣ 7 5 4
♠ A K 7 5 3
♥ Q 6
♦ A 5
♣ A J 8 2
The bidding at this table, as in most other cases, went:
South West North East
1 ♠ Pass 2 ♠ Pass
4 ♠ Pass Pass Pass
According to my correspondent, the diamond ten was led by West, and South captured East's king. Now South (my correspondent's partner) laid down the trump ace, obviously intending to knock out trumps as quickly as possible, but when the ten was played by East, South thought things over and concluded that a safety play was in order. In other words, he felt that there was a strong probability of West's holding the Q-9-6-2 of trumps originally, and if South now laid down the trump king, West would make two tricks in the suit and defeat the contract (since South had to lose two hearts). To prevent this, South selected a low trump as his second lead—and as a consequence, East made his now-blank queen. Every other North-South pair in the room won 11 tricks at spade contracts, which probably inspired my correspondent to ask whether, at match-point duplicate, such safety plays are advisable.
It is difficult to give a categorical answer to this question, because even at match-point play, it is often wise to safeguard the contract itself at the possible expense of an overtrick. However, it is also true that safety plays are not nearly as valuable at match-points as they are at rubber bridge. At the latter game, the overtrick is inconsequential, and thus if declarer can greatly increase his margin of safety, he naturally should do so.
In this case, however, it was a very close point whether South should have played for the 4-1 break of trumps he feared, or should have laid down the second high trump for the chance of the overtrick—a very important factor at duplicate play.
