Food Processing Idea Had Its Start In The Kitchen

HOMEMAKERS may not think of themselves as having been involved in food processing, but as late as 75 years ago they did much of it. This included butter-making, preserving, jellymaking, canning and drying fruits and vegetables, making ketchup and relishes, roasting coffee, making soup stock and smoking much of the pork. The methods they used are the basis of the methods that have been developed for processing in food factories. The U.S. Department of Agriculture has recently pointed up the fact that the processing of all farm food products has increased at an average of 2.6 per cent a year during the past half century, and all foods, by and large, come from farms.

WOMEN FIRST

Women deserve the credit for being the first to process these foods. With cereals the trend is toward adding more protein to low-protein grains, as well as fortifying with vitamins and minerals. Whenever a cereal is the base of an entree, it should be combined with at least 1/4 as much animal protein by weight. This activated the otherwise inert vegetable protein to make it complete. Milk activates the protein in cereal for breakfast or nursery foods. Whole natural cereals such as oatmeal, whole rye, wheat and puffed grains are not fortified because the natural mineral-vitamin elements are retained in processing. A good example of a simple cereal raised to entree-protein status follows: Measurements are level, recipes for 6 CHEESE POLENTA WITH TOMATO-MEAT SAUCE 1/2 c. enriched cornmeal 1 tsp. butter 2 c. hot milk 1 egg, beaten 1/4 lb. shredded sharp Cheddar cheese Gradually stir cornmeal into milk. Add butter and salt. Cook over boiling water 15 to 20 min., stirring occasionally. Stir egg and cheese together (reserve 1/2 c. cheese). Pour into buttered shallow 2 in. x 8 in. x 2 in pan; chill. Cut into oblongs; place in buttered shallow baking pan. Pour tomatomeat sauce over cornmeal; dust with remaining cheese. Bake 15 to 20 min. in a slow oven, 325 deg. F., or until cheese melts and oblongs are heated. TOMATO-MEAT SAUCE 1/2 c. chopped onion 1 peeled section garlic, minced 1 tsp. butter 1/4 lb. ground beef 1 c. sliced fresh mushrooms 1/2 tsp. salt 1 (No. 2) can tomato (2 1/2 c.) 1 (6 oz.) can tomato paste 1 tsp. sugar 1/2 tsp. oregano Sauté onion and garlic in butter until color turns. Add meat and mushrooms; cook and stir
