The Dreyfus Matter.

NEW YORK, June 16.—A despatch to the Times from Paris says it appears from a declaration made in the chamber M. Waldeck-Rousseau, that the government cannot deprive ex-Captain Dreyfus of the right of completely rehabilitating himself by any scheme of general amnesty. The amnesty must give Dreyfus the right of re-statement with his previous grade M. Waldeck-Rousseau, therefore, opposes the bill. It is believed here that M. Dreyfus will make another attempt at complete rehabilitation at the exposition.

THACKERAY AND BADEN-POWELL.

(London 'Star.') At a dinner party at the Baden-Powells, when he was not three years old, the guests being all learned and distinguished men, such as Buckle and W. E. W. Thackeray was handing Mrs. Baden-Powell into dinner, when he noticed that one of the little children was following in behind. This was the future scout, and the young gentleman was just scrambling into a chair, when Thackeray, fumbling in his pocket produced a new shilling, and said in his caressing voice, 'There, little one, you shall have this shilling if you are good and run away.' A despatch from Lorenzo Marques says: "President Kruger is holding on to his gold and issuing paper notes from a press in his executive car. The Boer Government's coin stock is exhausted and the officials are now paying out plain gold discs unstamped. Some who have declined to accept notes have taken their salaries in gold bars. The Boer Government is still paying out much gold in that way."

It is interesting to note that it was young Cronje, the son of the General, who surrendered Klerksdorp to General Hunter. He will probably have a sea voyage for the benefit of his health and time to recuperate in his new family circle at St. Helena.

LIVE STOCK BREEDERS.

Sportsmen Legislators and the Farmers' Sheep.

THE PRIDE OF WAR.

The information given by Miss Hibbard, the Montreal nurse recently returned from South Africa, as to the wonderful organization and marvellously complete equipment of the British military hospitals in South Africa brings home to us a feature of the war now nearing an end which has gained general commendation. During the progress of a war public attention is pretty well monopolized by actual fighting. The combatant troops of the three arms hold the public eye; the organizations that maintain them at the front that feed and clothe them, that guard their lines of communication, that supply them with ammunition, that rescue their wounded and take care of their sick, are forgotten. And yet except the troops along the lines of communication and the departmental corps did their duties thoroughly the armies winning laurels at the front would be paralyzed. All authorities agree with Miss Hibbard that everything connected with the army medical and hospital services during the present war has been most admirable, exciting at once the admiration and the surprise of foreign experts.—Montreal Witness.
