GEESSE SHIPPED.—Mr. S. Jones shipped 1600 live geese from Summerside to Boston yesterday.

DRAWING FOR OYSTERS.—The Journal says it is reported that the best parts of Richmond Bay are being dragged for oysters. This is not fair to those who fish legitimately, and it should be stopped at once by the authorities. Fishing with drags is contrary to the law, and cannot be permitted.

ISLAND POTATOES.—The Boston correspondent of the St. John Sun says: Prince Edward Island potatoes are beginning to arrive here, notwithstanding the duty of 25 cents a bushel. Reports from Island shippers say the crop there is very fair, while here reports of short crops are coming in from all sections.

WRECKAGE PASSED.—The schooner Neil Dow, which came into Summerside harbor on Monday, reports having passed in the Straits a vessel's house, water casks, and other wreckage, evidently part of some schooner that has been wrecked during the late gale. There was no name, however, to give any clue to the vessel.

A VALUABLE CARGO.—On her trip from Summerside to Halifax, Friday night last, the steamer Fastnet, Bethel, took from here, for Great Britain, 3,249 boxes of cheese, containing 227,414 pounds, valued at \$19,178, shipped Mr. Thos. J. Dillon, Charlottetown, and 568 boxes, containing about 40,000 pounds, and valued at about \$2,000, shipped by Mr. R. T. Holman, who also shipped about two hundred dollars worth of canned lobsters.—Summerside Journal.

Here Indians and whites sat down together by the tables set in the woods, and enjoyed the roast turkey, beechnuts, clam chowder, fish, salad, cakes, fruit and other delicacies provided. It was at this historic dinner that the first oysters were served. The illustrations of the article show portraits of the Pilgrim fathers.
