BRITAIN PLANS LARGER FLEET

Will Invoke Escalator Clause In London Treaty.

(C.P. Cable By Guardian's Special Wire)

LONDON, July 3—Usually well-informed sources said tonight there was no doubt that Great Britain in due course would invoke the escalator clause of the London Naval Treaty of 1930.

This step, it was explained, would be taken to enable Britain to retain 40,000 tons in excess destroyer tonnage which otherwise would have to be scrapped at the end of the year.

The 1930 treaty expires at the end of this year while the Washington naval limitation of 1923 will be terminated automatically at the same time. It has been denounced by Japan.

Japan's formal notification that she would not at present adhere to the new London Naval Treaty, signed last March by Great Britain, the United States and France, was delivered to the foreign office today.

Willing To Accede

WASHINGTON, July 3—The United States government has notified Great Britain that it is willing to accede to the British proposal for an increase in destroyer strength. A note was dispatched from Washington to London early this month.

While neither government has published the text of the correspondence, the United States is understood to have taken the position that the only way for a government to increase its naval power is for that country to invoke the escalator clause of the 1930 London Naval Treaty.

Missionary Rally In Montague

SUSSEX, N.B., July 3—Camp Sussex yesterday afternoon presented a busy aspect. At the provisions arranged in town uniforms and equipment were being issued while at the armory on the camp grounds advance parties were being directed with great efficiency as to pitching of canvas and preparation of the military camp grounds.

All were busily engaged in preparing for the remainder of the 600 officers and men who will arrive today by train and car to go under canvas. Those arriving by train will move to the camp grounds on foot.

The following regiments had advance parties working yesterday: 8th Princess Louise's Hussars, New Brunswick Dragoons, 1st Battalion Carleton Light Infantry, 1st Battalion York Regiment, 1st Battalion North Shore Regiment, 1st Battalion New Brunswick Rangers. A sub-lieutenant and seven midshipmen reported also from H.M.S. Dragon for musketry training and will remain in camp until Saturday. They will take up their quarters in headquarters lines.

Colonel H. G. Wood, M.C., D.A. and Q.M.G., was in charge at headquarters until the arrival of Brigadier L. F. Page, D.S.O., officer commanding Military District No. 7, who will arrive in camp today. Under Colonel Wood at the present time are Major J. P. Simon, district ordnance officer, and Captain Leach, D. and T.O.

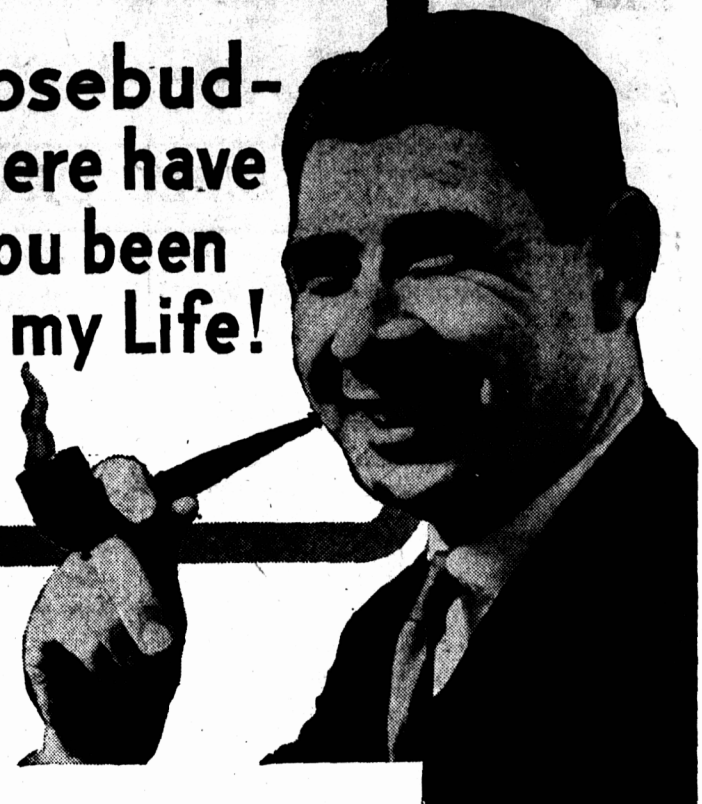
Muster parades were held today, when an official check of all those in camp was taken. The only real change in the order of the camp this year is the fact that the 8th Princess Louise's Hussars and New Brunswick Dragoons, cavalry regiments, are motorized units covering an area of over 50 square miles in their manoeuvres. The layout of Camp Sussex is similar to that of last year. The tents of the general headquarters staff have been pitched on a specially prepared site near the permanent armory on the grounds.

The 9th Mounted Brigade is encamped near the bungalow of the Hussars and is composed of men and officers of the Hussars and Dragoons. The Infantry Brigade is composed of four units from Carleton County, York County, the North Shore and the Rangers. The officers of this brigade will hold their mess in the Rangers' Bungalow. Because of the period of mourning, due to King George's death, the customary formal receptions of the various units will be omitted.

Erects Mammoth Apartment Block

LONDON, July 3—(C.P.)—To accommodate more than 3000 people, the largest block of flats—1850—in Europe is being built near the Houses of Parliament. They will be smokeless and sound proof, with a private swimming bath, a gymnasium, squash courts, and will surround a garden of four acres. Rent-free telephones and wireless will be connected throughout and under the garden a centrally-heated garage for 400 cars is

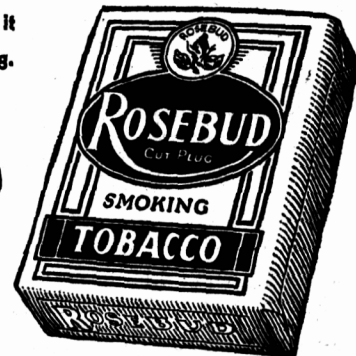

All purses divided, 50%, 25%, 15%, and 10%. Five per cent. of the money raced for each heat will be deducted from the first and second horses. Three per cent. from the third and fourth horses.

All drivers must wear a driver's uniform that will be satisfactory to the judges.

Two entries of the same ownership may start in the same race, providing the full 5 per cent. is paid on each starter, the drivers having the approval of the Judges.
