

Firemen Stage Display For Prevention Week

Several hundred spectators gathered at the federal building in Charlottetown yesterday afternoon as the firemen staged their annual fire prevention week display.

City fire officials stage the display during the fire prevention week to show citizens the department's modern fire fighting methods and equipment.

A full scale alarm was turned in from the federal building at 4 o'clock and two pumps and the aerial ladder truck responded to the scene. Two pumps and the other ladder truck were held in reserve at the fire station.

The building was evacuated during the display. The arrival of firemen, seven heavy streams of water were brought to bear on the front of the building by the two pumps.

Two of the streams operated from the aerial truck that was stationed on Queen Street. One heavy stream was directed on the roof from the top of the 100-foot ladder and a smaller stream operated from part way up the ladder.

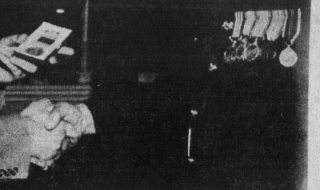
The demonstration ended in about 20 minutes and firemen rolled up hundreds of feet of hose used in the drill. One of the pumps was hooked up to a hydrant in front of the building and the other at the corner of Sydney and Power Street.

All operations during the display were handled as they would have been at a real fire and fire officials felt that the demonstration was over the spectators held a clear picture of the operation of the department although there are many complex fire fighting techniques which could not be shown to the public at a mock fire.

The display was under the direction of Chief H.H. Jewell and deputy Chief Gordon Stewart with captains Davey Crockett, William Connolly and John Turner in charge of their respective companies.

Phonetic Spelling, Reading Return Urged In Course

Charlottetown primary school teachers will become acquainted with a completely different approach to the teaching of reading and spelling this week as Miss Mac Isaac, New York, N.Y., conducts a three-day workshop here for teachers from grades one to four.

Miss Carden, who for the past 20 years has led a one-woman crusade against progressive education in the United States, is being assisted here by Dr. K.A. Parker, superintendent of city schools, to present her method of teaching children to read by the phonetic or sound system.

First ventures into the teaching of reading and spelling will be the first public school venture into the learning her methods in Canada, outside of the province of Saskatchewan.

Under the Carden method, children begin with the alphabet, are taught consonants, then vowels and their sounds. Having mastered the sounds of letters and their combinations, beginners under the Carden system hold the key for unlocking the new words they meet.

"They become sure in reading long words, confident of her method, read 'Peter Rabbit' in the third grade. They are encouraged to read at home. 'If they never read books in school, why should children read books at home?' she said in an interview yesterday.

"Fundamental grammar plays an important role in the presentation of this material and vocabulary development is stressed," she explained. "The goal is to teach a child to read well, write well, speak well, and to think."

Plans Made For Church And Rectory
