Reports \$20,000 Hidden Since First World War

EDMONTON (CP)—More than \$20,000, mostly in \$100 bills, were concealed for 35 years, first in a hole in the basement of a city home and later in a safety deposit box in a city bank, it was said Wednesday during an income-tax appeal board hearing.

The appellant was William A. Smith, 66, a retired city police detective sergeant who has lived here since 1910.

Board chairman Cecil L. Snyder of Ottawa reserved judgment.

Mr. Smith is contesting a tax assessment charged against large sums deposited in his savings account during the years 1950, 1951, and 1952. His counsel said that the First World War in 1914 he withdrew this sum, placed it in a large glass jar and buried it in the floor of his basement. He then set about changing the entire sum into \$100 bills, which in 1925 were transferred to a safety deposit box while working in a west coast lumber mill entered into a real-estate transaction which netted him \$20,000. He came to Edmonton in 1910, he began transferring the money transferred the account to a city bank and added \$5,000 through real-estate transactions.

Canada's Cobalt Bomb Cancer Unit For Burma

Canadian Press Staff Writer SINGAPORE (CP) — Canada will provide a cobalt bomb unit to Burma for cancer treatment under the Colombo Plan, External Affairs Minister Pearson told Asian planners today, and the Ottawa government will ask for "significant increase" in contributions to the plan for aiding Southeast Asia.

The Canadian minister, speaking to the Colombo Plan conference during the third day of its meeting here, gave no details of the Burma cancer project, but said it would be a two-year affair.

In addition, a special officer would be assigned to Ottawa to the Singapore area to travel on the Colombo Plan business, and a technical team would be sent to Indonesia.

He added that details are being worked out for the previously announced NRC atom reactor for India, but the cost of this would not be taken from the normal Colombo contribution by Canada. The Indian reactor likely would cost Canada about \$15,000,000 over a three-year period.

NEW PROJECTS SEEN
With increased contributions next year, the minister said, "we are hopeful that we shall be able to begin some modest but worthwhile projects, particularly those involving technical assistance and equipment to those countries which have not been receiving assistance from Canada."

In connection with the Indian reactor, both governments agreed in principle last month on the project.

Naming Of Member To Security Council Delayed

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (CP)—The UN General Assembly struggled through three hours of balloting and procedural wrangle Wednesday before finally deciding again to postpone election of an 11th member to the Security Council.

By a vote of 29 to 8 with 22 abstentions, the assembly approved an American proposal that it adjourn the election and proceed with balloting for the Economic and Social Council and the Trusteeship Council.

In elections to the Economic and Social Council which followed, Canada was successful on the first ballot. It will occupy the seat being vacated at the end of this year by Australia.

Canada received 48 votes. Also elected on the first ballot were the United States, with 50 votes, and India, with 44. Yugoslavia was elected on the second ballot with 46 votes.

DEADLOCK CONTINUES
The United States advanced its proposal after three ballots—the seventh, eighth and ninth since voting began last Friday—failed to break the deadlock between Yugoslavia and the Philippines.

The election is for the two-year, non-permanent Security Council seat being vacated by Turkey at the end of 1955.

Yugoslavia is supported by Russia and the Philippines by the U. S. Britain lined up behind Yugoslavia and informed sources said Canada did not vote. Voting is by secret ballot.
