

Four Trophies At Stake Today In Competition At Confederation Bonspiel

Four trophies will be at stake today in final matches which mark the end of the first section of the Fifth Confederation Bonspiel at the Charlottetown Curling Club. The finals were reached in all events at the close of play last night.

In three of the events it will be an all Charlottetown battle, while in the fourth the finalists were still to be decided.

The Maritime Central Airways trophy, emblematic of the Confederation championship, will see the Col. G. E. Full rink and the J. S. MacDonald rink meet in a 12-ender. The match is scheduled for 11 A.M.

The Col. Full rink will be finalists in another match at 3 p.m. when they play the Ed Tanton skinned crew for the Morrison and MacRae Trophy.

Still in the fight for the Imperial Oil Trophy, the Reserve Championship, will be the winner of the Jeffries-Acorn match against the loser of Full-McDonald match.

If the Charlottetown Islanders can knock off Halifax Saint Mary's at the Nova Scotia Capital tonight they will sew up first place in the Maritime Major Hockey League schedule with an even 100 points and five games still left to be played. Judging from the way they were flying here on Tuesday night when they whipped Moncton Hawks 7-1, they have more than a good chance of doing it too.

Playing better hockey than they have for some weeks, the Islanders were particularly sharp around the net and came up with some really smooth passing attacks that paid off in some classy goal-getting efforts. It was no soft touch for the Islanders either, as the score might indicate. The Moncton squad were as aggressive as any time they have been here this year and came up with some smart scoring attempts that only fast backskating, good defensive action and goaltending on the part of the locals that kept them at bay.

Making his second appearance on the ice this year, but his first as an all night effort, coach Leo Lamoureux came up with a more impressive performance. Teaming up with Larry Travis, the former Montreal Canadiens star gave the fans a demonstration of smart poke-checking and passing that was nice to see. Leo also proved himself adept at using his body hard body checks at times and also led some rushes on his own that set up aggressive attacks, one paying off in a goal.

Sparked by a tireless, hard skating Hub Beaudry at centre, the Horeck brothers were the big powerhouse for the Islanders with Johnny turning in a big performance off his left wing position to bang home four goals with Danny and Beaudry collecting assists on three of them in smart three-way passing attack. One of their attacks in the second period produced one of the prettiest scoring plays that has been witnessed here this season.

If the Islanders miss their chance to wrap up first place position in the schedule at Halifax tonight, they will get another crack at Saint Mary's over home ice here Friday night, which will be the Saints' last appearance at the Forum in regular league play and will be the last chance that local fans will have to see the Halifax squad in action this year unless they meet with Islanders in the playoff finals. With Halifax destined to meet Saint John Beavers in one semi-final bracket, and Islanders and Moncton in the other, anything could happen in their long best of nine series, and only time will tell what the outcome will be for the finals.

The Friday night game here will be the last contest of the week for the locals, who for the first time this season have no Saturday night road game to play. The remaining home games for the Islanders in the schedule, will see Saint John Beavers here on Monday night, and possibly the game with Moncton which was postponed from Jan. 30th. Road games left to play will be against Moncton on Tuesday and at Saint John on Thursday.

For the second time in a week local hockey fans witnessed an exciting and hilarious game of Broom Ball here on Tuesday night when the City Employees and the L. P. U. met in a return match before the Islanders-Moncton clash got underway. It was another barrel of laughs and fun for interested spectators with the City squad again demonstrating their prowess by downing the Labor Union boys with a shutout. They won the first contest 2-0 and took a 1-0 decision at the Tuesday night game.

In appreciation of the boys efforts in putting on the contests and as a prize to the winning team, Forum Manager Bill Brown announced last night that the members of the winning City team had all been given free passes for Friday night's Islanders-Halifax Big Four League clash. The gesture is a deserving one too.

GLACE BAY, N. S., Feb. 21—(CP)—Glace Bay Miners skied out a 6-5 win over league-leading Sydney Millionaires in the Cape Breton Major Hockey League tonight, coming from behind to defeat Halifax St. Mary's 4-3.

Late in the period Beavers broke into the scoring. On a passing play with Rogge Jodoin and Paul Platz, Thaler shipped around the lone defenceman for a point-blank drive.

Thaler scored again shortly after the start of the second period. He slashed at a rolling puck near the side of the Halifax cage and the puck rebounded off defenceman Pat Powers leg into the netting.

Campbell combined with Hollett and Watson to put the Saints out front again. He came in on left wing but his backhand drive had Brodeur beaten all the way. The stubborn Beavers refused to be discouraged. Les Ramsay, who had been pounded by the Halifax defence all night, accepted a pass from Buck Whitlock to deadlock the score as the period drew to a close.

Both clubs missed easy scoring chances by inaccurate shooting in the last period. Then, with less than four minutes on the clock, Thaler broke away again, trailed by Jodoin and Platz. D'Aoust blocked the first shot but was out of his net when Thaler trapped the loose puck for the payoff goal.

Beavers Come From Behind To Score 4-3 Victory Over Halifax

DARTMOUTH, N. S., Feb. 21—(CP)—Jackle Thaler, a refugee from the Cape Breton League, fired three goals for the Beavers tonight as the New Brunswick club overcame an early lead to defeat Halifax St. Mary's 4-3.
