NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

(Special Despatch to Examiner.)

BERLIN, July 3. Congress will terminate its labor with six sittings.

The questions of Asiatic Turkey and the navigation of the Danube and Dardanelles still remain to be settled.

A rumor, which was current to-day, that the Turkish Plenipotentiaries intend to withdraw from the Congress, is apparently unfounded.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 3. In Diplomatic circles, peace is considered assured.

General Tolleben is preparing to withdraw the Russian army before Constantinople to Adrianople, in three columns.

LONDON, July 3. The Times' despatch states, that the indemnity question, which was adjourned, will probably be referred to a commission.

The plenipotentiaries clearly recognize the importance of the question, and will not allow it to be settled separately. The discussion will be resumed at other sittings.

Advices from Bosnia report that there are 40,000 Turkish troops in Bosnia and Herzegovina, and 20,000 between Nivi Bazar and Pristina.

The Austrian army's occupation in Bosnia and Herzegovina muster 140,000 men, owing to the hostile attitude of the population of both Provinces; but no military resistance is anticipated.

Robertson and Thomas W. Dodd, Esq., requesting my attendance at a Reform meeting, to be held at the Athenaeum. Thomas W. Dodd, Esq., has as much right to append his name to a circular, requesting members of the Liberal Party to attend a committee meeting as any other man of the Reform Party; but when the Premier and another member of the Local Government become the election agents of some selfish political clique, then, Sir, as one Reformer, I shall pay no attention to any request to attend meetings of the Party. That Mr. Davies and Mr. Robertson have taken upon themselves to act as the representatives of an army of officials, is evident from the fact that the majority of those present at the meeting were Railway and Local officials. What right, I ask, has Mr. Davies or Mr. Robertson to dictate to the Liberal electors of this county who shall be the candidates for their suffrages at the next Dominion election? Is the same selfish spirit of grabbing offices for relatives and friends, as has been manifested by Mr. Davies in the past—both in Dominion and Local politics—to obtain in the coming election? Is the same incompetency, as has been shown in the management of Government affairs on this Island to be tolerated by the Reformers during the coming campaign? What do they suppose Reform electors are? Do they think we are to be driven to the polls like sheep—to obey the beck and nod of Mr. L. H.
