New Look For Sports Arena As Skating Season Nears

You don't have to be a sports fan to enjoy beauty so if you happen to be a person who enjoys having his or her breath taken away by man-made beauty we would urge you to drop into the Sports Arena on Fitzroy Street and if you take with you a mental picture of what this structure looked like say ten, five or even three years ago we can guarantee you a real thrill. At least we can if your makeup is along the line of this writer's.

Don't be surprised if as you walk through the door you don't recognize the place, for almost everything in the building including the roof has been given a real face-lifting. About the only thing left untouched is the basic skeleton of the building and from what we could see even this has been given a brand new coat of shining paint.

The first thing that will catch your eye is the improved and enlarged entrance. The walls are done in Douglas fir plywood and a new box office and turnstiles have been installed. As you pass through the turnstiles your eye will be caught by so many interesting sights that perhaps you won't know just where to look first but your interest will soon be caught by a splash of color from the seats and walls. The seats have been painted a bright red and blue and these colors are emphasized by a silvery aluminum paint on the steel beams, uprights and walls. The first two rows of seats around the Arena are painted red including the front pair on the south balcony. All other seats are in blue.

The facing of the seats, about six-feet high, is made of Douglas fir plywood and stained so that the pale yellowish hue of the plywood gives eye-catching appeal to the entire color scheme.

The next thing you will be quick to notice is the concrete floor installed this summer. The pouring of cement for this floor was done by M.F. Schurman Co. Ltd. and the job, expected to take nearly 12 hours to complete was finished in less than 8 hours - a near record time. The cement was carried by the company's trucks from the plant in Charlottetown. The cement covers the freezing system and something new has been added here also. If sometime during the winter a sudden thaw hits overnight while the city sleeps the Arena management will have no fear that the ice will melt for a new automatic freezing unit has been installed and when the temperature falls to a certain level the automatic machine will start itself and keep the ice nice and cold and hard.

Some other things that have changed the complexion of the Sports Arena are a new roof, installation of a ventilating system, a new and much improved sound system, a new promenade, a dressing room for hockey referees, a room for officials, reporters, etc., between periods of a hockey game, an improved entrance and another yet to be built under the north end stands, aluminum sheets covering the dilapidated and time worn windows on the front of the building, improved dressing rooms, a cement walk which circles the Arena and which will relieve con-

Rangers Blank Boston To Move Into Second Place

NEW YORK (CP) — New York Rangers vaulted into second place in the National Hockey League standings Wednesday night when they defeated Boston Bruins 2-0 in their first home appearance of the season.

The victory, goalie Lorne Worsley's second shutout in three starts, enabled the New Yorkers to hurdle Boston and the idle Toronto Maple Leafs to move within two points of the league-leading Detroit Red Wings, who are unbeaten in their three starts.

The Rangers' improved defensive play gave Worsley a record of two goals scored against him in his three games — the best in the league. He stopped all 27 shots the Bruins were able to direct at his net.

Allan Stanley, a former Ranger defenceman, was serving a penalty when Andy Heberton shot the Rangers into the lead at 4:32 of the second period.

Canadiens Call Up Ralph Backstrom

MONTREAL (CP) — Montreal Canadiens Wednesday called up Ralph Backstrom from the junior Ottawa Canadiens, on a three-game lend-lease basis as replacement for injured Henri (Pocket Rocket) Richard.

The management of the National Hockey League Canadiens said there is no thought of turning Backstrom professional and after his three-game stint consideration will be given to obtaining another replacement for the injured young centre.

The Pocket Rocket suffered knee injuries in last Saturday night's opening game. It is expected to be three weeks before he can return to action. His knee will be in a cast 10 days.

Reaume Out For Detroit Game

TORONTO (IP) — Toronto Maple Leafs will be without the services of defenceman Marc Reaume when they play the Red Wings in a National Hockey League game in Detroit tonight.

Reaume suffered a bruised heel in a workout.

Great Soccer Player Dies

LIVERPOOL, Eng. (AP) — Jack Southworth, rated Britain's greatest soccer center forward of his day, died Wednesday within a month of his 90th birthday.

He played three times for England, was a member of Blackburn Rovers' cup winning teams of 1890 and 1891 and his transfer from Blackburn to Everton brought a record fee for that time of £300 (840).

Southworth retired from soccer in 1896 — and turned his hand to music.
