The Lumber Exchange subscribers \$50,000, and already there is about three quarters of a million dollars subscribed provisionally; the subscriptions, if sufficient, are to be converted into stock. HONORS FOR AN ISLANDER ABROAD. - The Telegraph has the following notice of an award for Chatham tailoring: - Mr. A. H. Gillis, of Chatham, was awarded first prize for a suit of clothes at the Dominion Exhibition but it was not allowed on account of coming after the entries closed. The suit was bought by a gentleman of taste in the house of W. S. Symonds & Co., of Halifax. Mr. Gillis is well known in this city, having done business here for about six years; and we are glad to see that he is taking a leading part in the business he follows.

THE readings of the Rev. Mr. Carruthers in St. James' Hall, last evening, were well received by an appreciative but somewhat small audience. It was made very evident that the Rev. gentleman is a reader of a high order. For nearly two hours he entertained his hearers with his "selections from Scotch authors" to their hearts' content. We understand that Mr. Carruthers will deliver a lecture on Thursday evening - Subject: "Scottish Life and Character"; and we would suggest to the committee the propriety of securing a larger and more centrally situated hall.

BONES OF A MASTODON. - In the month of June last some laborers, while digging a ditch on the farm of Mr. George Cromwell, at East Oxford, Ontario, found the remains of an animal. These bones were examined by Prof. Haight and his assistant, of the University of Toronto, who had gone to the place where they were found, about five miles from Woodstock. These remains appeared to be part of a mastodon's skeleton. The jaw, which is complete, is two feet four inches long and the teeth weigh four pounds. The intention is to search for the remaining bones.

ROSS AND HANLAN. - A press despatch of the 25th of Portland, Me., says: - "It is probable that the Ross-Hanlan sculling match will be postponed until next June, as a gentleman from this city offers a \$5,000 purse provided this is done and he is allowed to name the course." Despatches from Toronto report that Hanlan is not very favorable now towards St. Louis. He is disgusted, however, at Ross' delay in naming the place for the race. Ross, it is understood, favors Lake Maranacook, Me., or Washington. The place will certainly have to be agreed upon at once as Nov. 15th has been selected as the time.

FEARFUL ACCIDENT. - The Fredericton Capital of Tuesday says: "Yesterday at Gibson, a little boy about four years old, son of Beverly Joubert, was, it is feared, fatally injured by a horse kicking him. It seems that a young horse was running loose around the field in the vicinity of the barn where the little fellow was playing. The horse coming quite near him, the boy picked up a small stick and struck the animal on the hind leg. In an instant the horse wheeled and struck him a terrible blow fair in the face. From the forehead to the chin the child's face was terribly bruised. Last night the injured boy was suffering greatly, and serious doubts are expressed of his recovery."

LATEST IRISH NEWS.

DUBLIN, Oct. 27.

This weeks United Ireland, the organ of the Land League, appears to-day. It contains no leading articles upon current events, but in a prominent place is left a blank column, surrounded by broad, black mourning lines, containing only the words, "Freedom of the Press in Ireland in 1881." In the adjoining column is printed an address to its readers, in which the following words occur: "Blank in editorial columns, every peasant in his mountain hut, and every friend of freedom the world over, will know how to translate. It will be a perpetual reminder that let bayonets be shaken in our faces, and let some of those whom we counted our own writing our hearts and give joy to our enemies. These principles are immutable and will yet triumph. In the hands of the Irish in America lies our dependence; upon the amount of assistance at hand for those who have to endure eviction depends disaster or triumph. Now as never before apathy among our trans-atlantic brethren means death; now or never, one glorious effort on their part means victory. When our voice is heard again we have firm faith, it will be in a shout of victory."
