Hearing Of Criminal Negligence Charge Continued

Preliminary hearing of the charge of criminal negligence which has been laid against Edward Matthews, Charlottetown, in connection with the death of the late Joseph Frederick Steele, continued in City Police Court before Magistrate K. M. Martin yesterday morning.

Const. Lloyd Archer and Reginald Heitz, on questioning by Crown representative J. P. Nicholson and cross-examination by Mr. J. A. MacDonald, Q.C. gave a brief recapitulation of evidence they had presented at the inquest.

New information was revealed by George P. MacDonald, a Charlottetown labourer; John MacGregor, a mechanic; Ronald MacDonald, S. R. Johnston, employee; and Arthur Henry, a representative of the P.E. Island Motor Vehicle Registration Branch in Charlottetown.

Evidence indicated that Joseph Matthews, father of the accused, had purchased a 1947, black, four-door, Oldsmobile sedan from S. R. Johnston Co. Ltd. on September 20 for the sum of \$40. The car of the same serial number as that one purchased at the car dealers was later registered in Charlottetown under the name of Mrs. Joseph Matthews. The same serial plate was later taken from the remains of a wrecked car which found just beyond the city dump. The plate was produced as an exhibit at yesterday's hearing by Mr. Nicholson.

During the period intervening between the time the car was purchased and the time the wrecked portion was discovered, the accused had been issued a beginning licence and was known to have driven the car in question.

On Sunday, October 21, George P. MacDonald met the accused near the Railway Wharf at 10:30 a.m. Mr. MacDonald was driving his 1946 half ton Fargo truck and mentioned that he wished to either sell it or trade. Negotiations stemming from this conversation led to a trade between MacDonald and Matthews later that day with the agreement being that MacDonald pay an additional \$25. for the Matthews' car. The cash was not paid at the time of the trade and nothing more was said about it ever, indicated later that he wanted the radio from the car.

On October 30, Mr. MacDonald left the car, parked in front of a MacGregor residence in the city, while he was at work. During the day, Matthews and another man came, and without permission from MacDonald, took the car and left the truck. The wrecking and burning, indicated by evidence given during the inquest, followed this.

Hearings were further remanded until Monday next.

Says Fishermen Must Solve Many Of Their Own Problems

Mr. Reid Sangster, St. Francis Xavier field worker for the Province of Nova Scotia in addressing a meeting of the P.E.I. Fishermen's Association at North Rustico last night said, "There is too much complacency or lack of interest among fishermen who are all too ready to blame the Government or some other outside body for conditions which exist when the trouble is actually within themselves."

Mr. Sangster, with Mr. C.F. Richards, secretary of the P.E.I. Fishermen's Association have been holding a series of meetings throughout the Province with the idea of bringing to fishermen as individuals their responsibility in the community. The annual meeting of the Association will be held at the Charlottetown Hotel on November 27. Hon. James Sinclair, Federal Minister of Fisheries will be the guest speaker. About 150 fishermen are expected to attend.

**BEST RESULTS**

The importance of co-operating with each other and with the various Government agencies was emphasized by Mr. Sangster who said it was only through this means that the best overall results, economically and socially could be achieved.

He stated that Christians, regardless of race or creed must stand together to build a strong economic and social structure which would stand as a bulwark against the entry of "isms" in this generation and the generations to come.

The speaker reminded his hearers that Communism has been built on negative attitudes. "Let us build our democracy on positive thinking," he added.

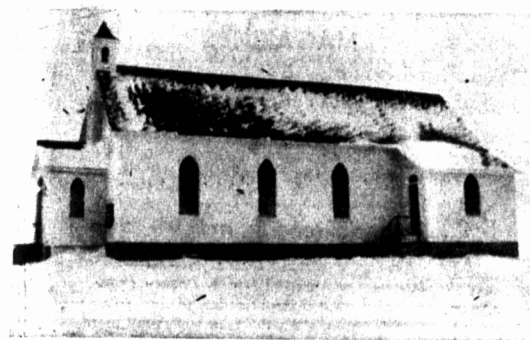
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HIGHFIELD UNITED CHURCH

Enlarged United Church At Highfield To Be Re-opened

Volunteers from the congregation of Highfield United Church are working early and late this week preparing the church for re-opening on the 25th.

For some years the growing congregation in this suburb of Charlottetown has been finding the 68-year-old building too small for its needs, especially the Sunday School. Highway improvements also left its position far from desirable. Early in the year the congregation decided to move the building and renovate it.

New committees were formed with the following Convenors: General Planning, Mr. W. B. Creed; Building, Mr. A. G. Robertson; Finance, Mr. S. I. Vessey; Purchasing, Mr. Wm. MacLean.

A canvass of the community found the people willing and generous in their subscriptions and pledges. The United Church of Canada helped, and organizations did their share. The larger part of the cost is now underwritten, and it is hoped that the outstanding balance will shortly be liquidated.

In the Spring the building was moved on a site donated by Mr. Ralph Gay, where a basement had been constructed. A porch with a tower was added at one end and a chancel flanked by two classrooms at the other end. A large basement provides more space for Sunday School and through the week activities. New windows and doors, pews, and lighting fixtures have been installed, and a forced draft oil furnace put in. The Sunday School has provided a platform carpet.

The services on Sunday will be under the direction of the Minister, Rev. Dr. E. A. Betts, assisted by Rev. G. Howard Christie who will also represent the Presbytery in the morning. Rev. G. W. Tilley in the afternoon, and former ministers in the evening. The choir will lead the praise with Mrs. A. S. Frizzell at the organ, and Mr. Roy Smallman, soloist in the morning, the Trinity Male Eight in the afternoon, and Mr. Stephen MacLeod, Bonshaw, in the evening. Arrangements are being made to accommodate an overflow congregation in the new Sunday School rooms.

Springhill Mine Disaster Victim

P. E. I. members of the 2nd Canadian Siege Battery in the First World War will remember Logan Milton, one of the many stalwart soldiers who proudly hailed Springhill as his home.

"Logie" was a good soldier. He served as a gunner throughout the war, and since has attended several Battery reunions in Charlottetown.

At the time of the explosion he was 1 1/2 miles under ground and died a hero trying to help many of the younger men to safety.

His body, together with several others, has not yet been recovered, but his memory will be kept fresh by those who served with him.
