DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

The Queen's Election Case

Fishery Correspondence Tabled

OTTAWA, May 3. The Queen's County election case came up this morning in committee.

Hon. Mr. Thompson opened the case by suggesting that the first point to be decided was whether Parliament ought to deal with the question at all.

Mr. Blake objected on the ground that the proposal would cause delay.

Mr. Mullock made a violent attack on the Minister of Justice, and asserted that Parliament should deal with justice in such cases without regard to form of law.

Mr. Davies agreed with Mr. Mullock. Mr. McCahey said that Parliament enacted in 1874 that no questions relating to disputed elections should be dealt with hereafter, only under the Controverted Elections Act.

After remarks by Mr. Edgar, Sir John said he had no doubt that Parliament had original jurisdiction to deal with all these matters, but he was not quite certain how far the House had divested itself of this right by passing the Controverted Elections Act.

After further remarks by Mr. Blake, the amendment was lost by a vote of 16 to 13, and the motion carried on the same division.

The amendment was by Weldon, of St. John that it was the duty of the returning officer to have returned Mr. King, and that the return should be amended, substituting the name of Mr. King for that of Mr. Baird.

The fisheries correspondence brought down by Minister Foster to-day, fills a large printed book of 260 pages which is carefully indexed.

Sympathy with Lansdowne

TORONTO, May 3. A special cablegram to the Mail says the Dublin Irish Times publishes an address signed by 504 tenants on Lord Lansdowne's Wiltshire estates, sympathizing with His Lordship in the attacks made by William O'Brien and others, expressing the great satisfaction felt by his English tenants at the treatment they have always received at his hands.

Steamer Lost

HALIFAX, May 3. The British iron steamer John Knox was lost with all hands at Channel, Nfld. last night. She had a crew of 30 men, was from Liverpool via Greenock, bound to Montreal and was one month out. She was commanded by Capt. Brodie. Not a man escaped to tell the story of the disaster; but it is believed she struck on rocks.

O'Brien's Visit

DUBLIN, May 3. The Dublin corporation has adopted a resolution calling upon Canadians to give O'Brien an enthusiastic welcome in order to mark their sense of the Marquis of Lansdowne's conduct. Copies of it are to be sent to members of all Canadian legislatures and municipalities.

Killed by Lightning

DETROIT, May 3. Particulars are received of the instant death of Alfred Arnold by lightning at Marysville, and of the fatal injury of Lena Schliemer at Whitmore Lake by the same agency.

Army Reorganization

ROME, May 3. The government has introduced in the Chamber of Deputies a bill to reorganize the army—increasing the number of regiments of field artillery from 12 to 24.

Killed and Wounded

DENVER, Col., May 3. The west-bound Atlantic and Pacific passenger train ran off the track near Coolidge, N. M., yesterday. Several persons were killed and wounded.

The Wimbledon Team

OTTAWA, May 3. Capt. Hartt, of St. John, N. B., is to be adjutant of the Wimbledon team. The commandant has not yet been appointed.

Coopers' Strike

MILWAUKEE, May 3. All the coopers in the city have struck. One hundred stone cutters struck against a reduction of fifty cents a day.

Fatal Explosion

CHICAGO, May 3. Late last night 8 men were wounded, 3 fatally and others more or less seriously by the explosion of a metal mould.

A New Steamer

YARMOUTH, May 3. The new steel steamer Yarmouth, to run between Yarmouth and Boston arrived here to-day.
