

# Howe Gives Uranium Plans

OTTAWA (CP)—Trade Minister Howe said Wednesday there is a limit on the amount of uranium which the government will purchase at premium prices.

However, he mentioned no figure in a statement on the government's uranium purchasing policy, clarifying previous statements in the Commons by himself and at a press conference last week by Prime Minister St. Laurent.

Mr. Howe said that on the basis of present information the government will not be able to negotiate after March 31, 1956, special premium price contracts for purchases of uranium.

He added it is not expected the government will be able to negotiate any new contracts between now and that date unless there is satisfactory evidence that production will start by April 1, 1957.

than those contained in the published price schedule."

Officials said the price in the special contracts is secret but is substantially higher than the guaranteed price. They also said that Eldorado at present is buying uranium for private producers under the guaranteed formula.

The reason was that under present conditions uranium cannot be produced at a profit at the guaranteed price.

Police after March, 1956 would have to be based on available markets for uranium.

**TOP PRICE \$7.25**

The guaranteed price schedule

provides a sliding scale, depending on the grade of ore. The maximum is \$6 a pound for concentrates with a uranium content of not less than 10 per cent in weight. In addition, a development allowance of \$1.25 a pound is paid during the first three years of production.

The higher prices paid under contract are arrived at by negotiation with producers, and are related to costs of production.

Mr. Howe said the special price formula involves two contracts—one between the producer and Eldorado and the other between the producer and the Atomic Energy Commission.

The price formula was set by AEC, the ultimate purchaser.

## Cadets Have Varied Activity At Aldershot

KENTVILLE—For the 600 Royal Canadian Army Cadets of the four Atlantic Provinces now undergoing seven weeks summer training at Aldershot Camp, this was a glorious and most enjoyable weekend.

All cadets were given three days leave but only about half were able to travel to their homes because of the distance. Everything possible was done by camp authorities to give the remaining 300 a good time and plenty of fun and entertainment was provided.

Travelling in army lorries, various parties made trips to Scotts Bay on the Bay of Fundy shore, historic Grand Pre and Evangeline Beach, Annapolis Royal's Fort Anne, the Habitation at Port Royal and H. M. C. S. Cornwallis naval base. Certainly the cadets this year are receiving a real insight into the more than 350 years history of this land of Evangeline. There was also swimming at Sunken Lake on the South Mountain and at Cornwallis naval base and Dominion Experimental Station pools.

Naturally also the boys had a taste of the water at Scotts Bay and Evangeline Beach. Monday a contingent of the cadets will take part in the three and a half century anniversary celebration at Annapolis Royal. On Wednesday the Royal Cadet Band will participate in Dartmouth's Naval Day celebration.

By between the weekend trips

there was plenty of sports program activities at the camp, including softball, volleyball, soccer, horseshoe pitching and track. All swimming is strictly supervised by K. H. Bell and J. A. Murphy. Red Cross swim instructors of Halifax, assisted by Lt. E. M. Morine, swim instructor at the Wolfville school.

The general health of the camp has been exceptionally good and there has been nothing of a serious nature. The food is reported to be very satisfactory and the weather though rather hot at times has been splendid with cool nights.

Training activities at the camp are reported to be progressing very favourably and the cadets are said to be acquiring themselves well. The cadet band is under command of Capt. O. R. Porter, Wolfville and has already taken part in church parades and march past. They will give a concert in Kentville or Wolfville and will play at the big track and field meet to be held August 20 and at other events, also at the minstrel show. Rehearsals for this show have been going on since last Wednesday and the big event will be staged in the drill hall, Aug. 19.

There is also a cadet choir of thirty voices for church services. This is directed by Lt. E. W. Freeborn of Moncton. There are twelve volleyball teams, five soccer, twelve football and forty horseshoe teams and 150 boys are entered for the track meet. Of the five companies in camp, each company has three evenings of sport and two afternoons of swimming. Saturday and Sunday voluntary swim parades are held.

Capt. Wallace Barteaux of Kentville is OC of track sports and he is assisted by Lt. D. McGeachy of St. Stephen, N. B., who is New Brunswick coach of track and field for Canadian Olympic training schemes.

### ONLY MARKET

Officials of Eldorado Mining and Refining Ltd., explained at a press conference that the information on which this policy is based was supplied by the United States. The U.S. at present is Canada's only market for uranium.

Eldorado now has contracts with three companies for purchase of uranium at prices higher than those guaranteed by the government. They are Gunner Mines Ltd. in the Beaverage area of northern Saskatchewan, the Pronto Uranium Mines Ltd. and Algom Uranium Mines Ltd., located in Ontario's Blind River area.

Officials said the government will continue to pay the special price to these companies during the life of present contracts. Special prices also will be paid under any new contracts signed between now and March 31, 1956.

However, all contracts will require that deliveries must be completed by March 31, 1962.

### WON'T TAKE EVERYTHING

Mr. Howe told the Commons July 20 that the government had agreed only to pay a guaranteed price for uranium concentrates it purchases until March 31, 1962. He also said the government never had stated it will absorb all uranium production until that date.

At his press conference last week, Mr. St. Laurent said he understands the government's policy is to purchase all uranium produced in Canada until 1962 at a maximum of \$7.25 a pound. He said his remarks were based on his understanding of the situation, but that Mr. Howe should know more about it than he.

Mr. Howe said Wednesday there are two arrangements for the purchase of uranium. These were special price contracts with producers and a published price schedule guaranteed until March 31, 1962.

### PRICE CEILING APPLIES

The statement said Eldorado is committed to purchase all acceptable uranium concentrates which are offered for delivery under the published price schedule. However, he said "Eldorado has no commitment to purchase all uranium which is offered at prices higher

## U.S. May Need To Revise Policy Towards Gen. Tito

The time for a careful reappraisal of U. S. policy toward Tito and the Communists of Yugoslavia may be at hand.

Tito has been issuing statements full of assurances of his abiding friendship for the United States and the Western nations. But these protestations are followed by the announcement that his party is re-entering into relations with the Communist party of the Soviet Union.

Tito has announced his relations with the Moscow party would be like those he maintains with Western Socialists. This aspect of his announcement might raise strong suspicions of him in Washington.

maintain relations with Socialists in the non-Communist countries. In the last year Tito has been furiously engaged in making and strengthening his contacts, particularly in Asia. The question must arise: Is he about to take over his old job again, now that Stalin is out of the picture?

The United States poured almost \$1,000,000,000 in assistance into Yugoslavia in the years it was an outpost of the Cominform. Now the United States has every right to feel uneasy about Tito's future course.

That course seems to be steadily eastward. He has indicated it is his belief the satellite Communist countries no longer are dominated in their internal affairs by Moscow. But Budapest radio announced Tuesday that the state prosecutor of Communist Hungary had been ousted.

### MOSCOW SHOWS CLAWS

The removal of the prosecutor, Calman Czako, came a week after a Tito speech which complained that some satellite Communists still were arresting people for Titoism, particularly in Hungary and Czechoslovakia.

Obviously Tito's complaint was heard in Moscow and Moscow took steps.

Tito is making abundantly clear that he remains a Communist devoted to the idea that an elite must lead the whole world's proletariat. The only difference between Tito and the satellite leaders seems to be, then, that he pursues the cause as a partner of Moscow rather than its subordinate.
