## SPAIN AND THE UNITED STATES.

### The Resolutions Debated

### IN THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Spanish Government Resolved to Resist Any Interference.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

WASHINGTON, April 14.—The resolutions declaring for war between the United States and Spain were debated by the members of the Senate and of the House of Representatives, yesterday. The resolutions passed the House of Representatives, and were laid over in the Senate until today on a point of order.

MADRID, April 14.—The Spanish Minister for War, is firmly resolved to repel every attack made, directly or indirectly, on the sovereignty of Spain in Cuba. The very worst impression prevails regarding the situation.

## THE FOREIGN POWERS.

### Their Action Awaited

BY THE UNITED STATES.

Spanish Papers Attack Consul-General Lee—Gomez Offers Assistance.

WASHINGTON, April 14.—There is much speculation here as to whether the European powers will step in if war is declared. It is possible that a strong note may be sent to the President of the United States. The action of Great Britain in this matter is anxiously awaited.

HAVANA, April 14.—The papers here attack Consul-General Lee saying that he was frightened and ran away.

New York, April 14.—A letter has been received from Gen. Gomez in which he says he is preparing to co-operate with the United States troops in case of war in an attack on Havana.

## TRYING TO MEDIATE.

## PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

### Debate on The Budget.

MORE ABOUT THE FAST ATLANTIC LINE.

Government Difficulties Overcome.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, April 14th.—Honourable Mr. Patterson spoke on the budget and was replied to by Clarke Wallace, yesterday afternoon, who remarked that Mr. Patterson's gift for misrepresentation was equal to his capacity to make a noise.

The Premier made a brief statement respecting the fast Atlantic Line. He said that Messrs Patterson, Tate & Co., had met great difficulty, but had made some progress, notwithstanding.

The Government had information that the greater part of the capital required had been underwritten and that a strong board was formed.

He had reason to believe that the ships required would be under construction by the first of July.

In reply to a question the Premier said that he could see no reason why the plebiscite bill should not be introduced at close budget debate. He could not say what questions would be proposed in the bill.

Replying to a further question by Sir Charles Tupper, Sir Wilfrid Laurier said that after the vote was taken the government would abide by the decision of the people.

The Kettle River Bill was discussed at some length.

## British Columbia Elections.

VANCOUVER, April 11.—The announcement is made in Victoria that Premier Turner has arranged with the leader of the opposition, Mr. Semlin, who is also a conservative, to form a coalition. This means that the coming election will be fought on political lines laid down in Dominion politics.

## WAKE UP!

Sir,—Is it not time for our rulers, both provincial and city, to rub the cobwebs out of their eyes and remember the offer made by the Provincial Exhibition Association to provide for an Exhibition next fall open to the other Provinces?

Exhibitions open to outside competition and exhibitors from abroad invited and urged by all sorts of inducements to come, are considered by enterprising communities to be one of the necessities of the times. The regulation in our former exhibition prize list which required manufactured exhibits to be made in this Province and live stock to be owned here, is a condition never required by any other considerable exhibition anywhere. It turns our shows into mutual admiration societies, and robs the shows of any true emulation or spirited competition. In other places exhibitions are made the means of advertising the peculiar advantages of the country in which they take place; indeed that is generally their object. Now in what way can Provincial Exhibitions, managed as ours have been in the past, advertise the strong points in Charlottetown or Provincial industry? We know it has been a failure in that respect, and our county shows carried on in the same narrow unenterprising spirit have been more pronounced disappointments. What we need is a complete change in our ideas as to the aims and requirements of a Provincial Exhibition the expenditure for carrying out successfully such a show, with accommodation for stock and machinery from New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, together with a greatly extended prize list and a sum to pay for the carriage of stock and other exhibits form distant points in this province, must be very large for so small a province. Arrangements should be made for combining all our shows for one year at least into one good substantial Exhibition. Lively Charlottetown with its furniture, boot and shoes and wood-working factories, machine shop, and foundries can bring out a good show in those lines, and our farmers can certainly more than hold their own in the products of their fields, orchards and stables.

Some people hint that Charlottetown has no accommodation for the crowds of sight-seers that would flock to such a show. In this supposition they acknowledged the likelihood of the success of an Interprovincial Exhibition. But as it must extend over several more days than our old style shows the fear of a crush is groundless.

PROGRESS.

Secured by Uncle Sam.

BUENOS AYRES, Argentine, April 11.—The United States government has purchased the iron steamer Nord America from Lavellace Navigation Italiano for \$530,000. The Nord America has just arrived at La

Plata from Genoa. She is known as the fastest steamer now in service between Europe and Argentine. The Spanish residents of San Paulo, Brazil, have organized a battalion of 500 men to go to Cuba in the event of war between the United States and Spain. The sale of the Nichero to the United States has been concluded.

The Russians and Chinese.

PEKIN, April 12.—Slight conflict between Russians and Chinese has taken place at Kin Chou. It is believed this encounter gave rise to the report from Yokohama last night that a collision had taken place between the British and the Russians at To-Lien-Wan. Kin-Chou is a little way north and near Ta-Lien-Wan.
