Fog Induces Slumber.
"On a foggy day," said the manager of a big London restaurant, "it is almost impossible for us to cope with the demand for luncheons and teas, and all manner of people flock in then whom we never see at any other time.

It might be that the general miserableness of the city forces people to unconsciously seek comfort in a harmless little bout of extravagance or that the fog drives customers in here in the hope that they might run across friends who would have otherwise been encountered outside. But the most feasible explanation seems to be the gas and electric lights.

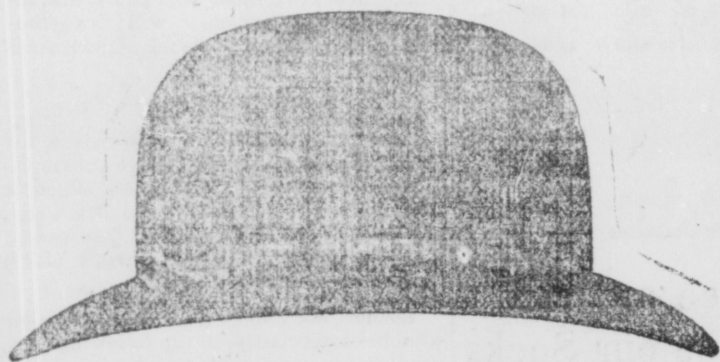

New Island off Borneo's Coast.
A sensation has been created in the Straits Settlements and the far east by the sudden appearance of a new island off the coast of Borneo, between Nemakol and Lumbidan. The island is 45 feet high, a third of a mile long and a quarter of a mile wide. For the most part the island is merely an upheaval of the bottom of the sea, but at its highest point there is a distinct mud crater, with the cone shaped top and sides fallen in. The sides of the cone give evidence of having been forced up through a crevice in solid rock. The British North Borneo Herald says the cone, which is 30 yards in diameter, is surrounded by another and larger cone, which shows that with more pressure from beneath a much larger crater would have been formed. The rising of the island was not accompanied by any volcanic disturbance. The crater is seamed with crevices and cracks, which emit gases. By applying a torch to a small crack in the crater the gas ignites and burns steadily.—St. Louis Globe-Democrat.

Formerly Mrs. Tom Thumb.
The handsomest dwarf this country has ever seen, the Countess Magri, formerly Mrs. Tom Thumb, is still a well preserved woman, and has just been giving demonstrations of cookery at a food fair in Boston. She wore a small white apron, and while preparing the dishes on a raised platform lectured entertainingly about the cooking she had encountered during her travels over the earth. The countess was born in Massachusetts 56 years ago, and her real name was Mercy Lavinia Bump. She was married in 1863 to General Tom Thumb, who died 14 years ago, his widow taking another husband, not a dwarf, several years later.—Boston Herald.

Sea Birds Persecute a Land Bird.
A very singular thing happened on the last trip of the Kennebec to Boston. The steamer was off Cape Elizabeth when a dove, similar to the common doves in the street, flew aboard. He remained there for some time, but was soon frightened off. Whenever he left the boat he was followed and chased by the sea gulls, until obliged to again light. At last, thoroughly tired out, and when night was approaching, he settled on the deck, crawled under one of the lifeboats and there remained until Boston was reached, when he flew off none the worse for his ride.—Kennebec Journal.

Maine Hotels.
"There are 200,000 visitors to Maine and New Hampshire every summer," says a Maine man, "and they leave \$40 each or more. We secure \$8,000,000 a year from them.
