### Of Special Interest to Women

#### Mending and Darning

We are told that a "stitch in time saves nine;" but it is often the case that a little bit of judicious prevention will save ninety-and-nine. The great difficulty in mending lies in the almost impossible tact of darning the edges of the rent together in good shape. It is a good plan to buy some net lace, such as is used for canopies or draperies, or for the darning-in pattern with which the ladies are familiar. If, when the knees of children's garments wear thin, a bit of this lace is based on the under side and carefully darned down on the outside with fine thread or yarn the color of the fabric, the garment will wear almost as long again. A piece of fine net darned down on the wrong side of a tablecloth will save a large rent, and will scarcely show. A careful housekeeper, who believes that waste of anything is almost a crime, uses coarse net for darning thin places in towels. It is surprising how much longer they will wear, and how easy the work is. Cut the lace in a square, if possible to use it that way, lay it smoothly on the goods, and with a long needle and very soft thread follow the meshes of the lace in and out, each mesh alternating until the edges are sewed fast. Be careful not to take the stitches through to the right side, at least if it is desirable not to have the patch show through. Then a few judiciously distributed running down on the right side of the goods, being very careful to follow grain of the fabric, and make a short stitch on the right with a long stitch on the wrong side, and a great deal of hard work in the way of later patching will be avoided.  
It is surprising how many uses one will find for this lace, once it is kept in the work basket. A couple of yards of mosquito netting will furnish a great many patches, and will also make the most convenient and useful bags for buttons, thread or many sorts of garden seeds. Indeed, its uses are manifold, as any housewife will find once she makes the experiment.—Northern Messenger.

#### Amount of Material.

The amount of material for skirts varies according to the pattern and the economical tendencies of the cutter. A circular skirt four yards wide and of two gores requires four yards of forty-inch goods and seven of twenty-two. Five-gore skirts of the same width need seven yards of the narrow-width goods and four yards and five-eighths of forty-two-inch goods. With a circular flounce to the knees the latter skirt needs another yard. If of seven gores and four yards wide allow eight yards of twenty-two-inch goods or five and a half of forty. In giving you these measurements I allow for a medium skirt, which is forty inches long, and which usually requires a waistband of twenty-three inches.—Ladies Home Journal.

#### For the Hands.

A formula for a wash, given by a noted specialist at the request of a number of ladies obliged to do their own household work, and desirous of keeping their hands in nice order, is as follows:  
Rained or boiled water..... 1 gallon  
Powdered borax..... 1/2 ounce  
Oat meal..... 1 package  
Let the mixture stand for two or three days; then strain and add a little alcohol to keep it. If desired, a little glycerine may be added to the mixture, though it is not necessary, as the oat-meal provides an oily element.

#### Apples for Health.

"Apples" says a medical authority, "are an excellent brain food, a preventive of throat disease, and so easily digested that every person should eat at least one apple that is ripe and juicy before going to bed. The most delicate system is not injured by this fruit if it be slowly and perfectly masticated, because it contains more phosphoric acid in an easily assimilated form than any other fruit. Apples stimulate the action of the liver and encourage healthful sleep. Another physician prescribes an apple scraped into pulp just before retiring, to patients afflicted with insomnia."

#### Canned Gooses.

Young house-keepers cannot be too often reminded that as soon as a can of any fruit, vegetable, fish or meat is opened its contents should be emptied at once into an earthen or glass bowl and allowed to stand for a few hours to

draw back the oxygen that heat has eliminated. Left open in a tin can, poisonous chemical changes will take place

#### Gilt Frames.

Gilt frames may be cleaned by wiping them gently with a soft, clean cotton cloth moistened in sweet oil.

#### NEWS NOTES

The interests of Canada at the Paris exposition in 1900 will be represented by three commissioners, one from Ontario, one from Quebec and one from the Maritime Provinces. Mr J X Perreault, of Montreal, has been appointed by the Government as the Quebec member of the commission. Mr Perreault was at Philadelphia in 1876 and at Paris in 1878.

The general traffic manager of the Canadian Pacific Railway, Mr D McNicoll, estimates that 50,000 people have gone to the Klondike this season and that 20,000 of them will return to their homes without reaching the gold fields. Each man carried with him an outfit costing several hundred dollars, and his travelling expenses were not less than \$250 or \$300, making a total average expenditure of not less than \$600, or a total investment of \$30,000,000 in pursuit of the phantom. Thus far less than one-fifth as much has been brought away, taking the miners own statements as correct.
