Farm Income For P. E. I. Up First Half This Year

OTTAWA, Sept. 17 - (CP) - Canadian farmers got higher prices for wheat and livestock in the first half of 1950, but the amount of cash income they earned in that period was sharply below the cash they got in the first half of 1949.

The Bureau of Statistics reported Saturday that cash income from the sale of farm products totalled \$870,516,000 in the 1950 period - a drop of 18.6 per cent from the \$1,069,405,000 earned the previous year, and 5.9 per cent below the \$925,008,000 earned in the six months of 1949.

Most of the reduction had nothing to do with prices. The bigger income in the 1949 period was due to the fact that the Government had announced a 20-cent-a-bushel increase in the price it was paying for Western wheat delivered to the Canadian Wheat Board. The payment, sending the initial wheat price from \$1.55 to \$1.75, covered all wheat delivered to the Board since 1945.

Thus, a farmer who had been delivering steadily to the Board since 1945 got unusually heavy payments during the first half of 1949. He received his normal payments during the first half of 1950.

The Bureau said cash income from the sale of wheat in 1950 was up as a result of both higher initial prices and increased marketing. Smaller markets and lower initial prices reduced income from coarse grains.

With the exception of hogs, income from livestock was higher. Cash income from this source totalled \$389,400,000, an increase of 10.4 per cent over the 1949 figure of \$352,800,000.

Dairy products income, estimated at \$153,700,000, was seven per cent below the 1949 total of \$165,000,000. Some of the decline was attributed to lower prices for eggs.

Because of the smaller payments made to Western wheat farmers in the 1950 period, the Prairies bore most of the cash-income decline.

The Bureau said that in the case of Saskatchewan, the drop in income amounted to almost 50 per cent, in Manitoba 44 per cent and in Alberta 33 per cent.

Provincially, Ontario farmers led the cash-income field, taking more than one-third of the total income. The total for Ontario was estimated at \$324,224,000, compared with \$311,172,000 in 1949; Quebec, \$159,022,000, compared with \$167,437,000; Alberta, \$139,463,000, compared with \$207,968,000; Saskatchewan, \$114,322,000, compared with \$221,240,000.

Other Provinces with 1949 totals in brackets: Manitoba, \$51,055,000 (\$80,981,000); British Columbia, \$35,836,000 (\$35,103,000); New Brunswick, \$20,456,000 (\$20,012,000); Nova Scotia, \$16,638,000 (\$16,659,000); Prince Edward Island, \$9,502,000 (\$8,813,000).

FROST DAMAGE
Severe frost injury is reported from the Experimental Station at Beaverlodge, Alberta. On August 15, five inches of snow fell, which flattened the grain crops and five degrees of frost the following night wiped out tender crops like tomatoes, corn and beans.

Officials say that cereal crops were considerably damaged by the frost and low grades may be expected. Farther north at Fort Simpson, N. W. T., the frost damage was reported to be light and crops are said to be in excellent condition.

POTATO PRODUCTION PRACTICES
Potatoes in some instances are replacing summerfallow in preparation for the sugar beet crop, according to officials in the Economics Division of the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, who are making a study of potato production practices in the irrigated areas of southern Alberta.

In some cases it was found that potatoes followed summerfallow or a legume crop ploughed down.

Figures Tabled Re Potato Prices

FIGURES TABLED
The present market price to the growers in Prince Edward Island of potatoes delivered to the market is 70 cents per 75 lbs., or 56 cts. per bushel, according to a return tabled in the House of Commons last week.

In the same return, the present market price to the growers in New Brunswick for 166 lbs. of potatoes was given at \$1.00-\$1.10, some \$1.25. To Quebec as to the average cost of producing and marketing potatoes in both Provinces, the answer was, "Information not available."

In another return it was intimated that 33,543,981 lbs of butter is now owned by the Government. The entire balance of 1949 butter, amounting to 9,765,802 lbs, was sold to the trade in Canada during the months of July and August. The net price received in July was 50-20 cts., in August 50-02 cts. These prices cover the sales of 1949 butter and allow for deterioration in quality resulting from storage, plus charges due to extra handling in having samples withdrawn from storage for grading, tempering, etc.

Crop Rotations

OTTAWA, Sept. 1950 - The establishment of a farm plan and a systematic crop rotation is the fundamental procedure followed on Illustration Station farms in eastern Canada. Such a plan allows for the progressive development of soil improvement practices over the entire tillable acreage of the farm. The rotation adopted depends on the type of farming, the adaptation of grasses and legumes, the proportion of cash crops desired, weed infestation, soil type and the area of available crop land. Crop rotation allows for the proper balance of crop production, simplified management, regularity in weed control programmes, more orderly appearance of the farm and greater crop yields.

Each Illustration Station farm is organized on the basis of a crop rotation which provides a proper balance of cereals and forage for the livestock carried. In many cases, a second shorter crop sequence is followed on a part of the farm particularly adapted to such crops as corn or roots. The most popular main farm rotation is one of five years duration: 1. Hoed crop, they vary in length from the short three-year rotation for special or hoed-crop production to the ten-year rotation where alfalfa is particularly well adapted and can be left down for periods up to seven years. In all of the rotations studied on Illustration Stations in Eastern Canada one or more years of hay crops are included in the cycle.

The fact that yields are well sustained by orderly farm practices is borne out by the level of productivity on Station farms. In some instances the crop yields have been increased through several rotation cycles. It has been found that the longer crop cycles have been more effective in maintaining high productivity.

The average yield of 125 crops of Turnips in four-year rotations has been 17.55 tons per acre, while the average yield of 324 crops in five-year rotations has been 22.76 tons. Similarly in the four-year rotation, 146 crops of oats have averaged 37.1 bushel per acre, while 392 crops in the five-year rotation have averaged 43.1 bushel. Relatively higher yields of first and second crop hay have been obtained in the five-year rotation.

From the standpoint of efficient farm management and sustained farm productivity, it is advantageous for every farmer to review his farm set-up and determine the proportion of crops required to meet his livestock feeding demands, the adaptation of the various crops to his soil, and any special problem such as weed control. After careful consideration the establishment of an organized and methodical crop rotation will make the farm more efficient to manage, more productive and more attractive in appearance.

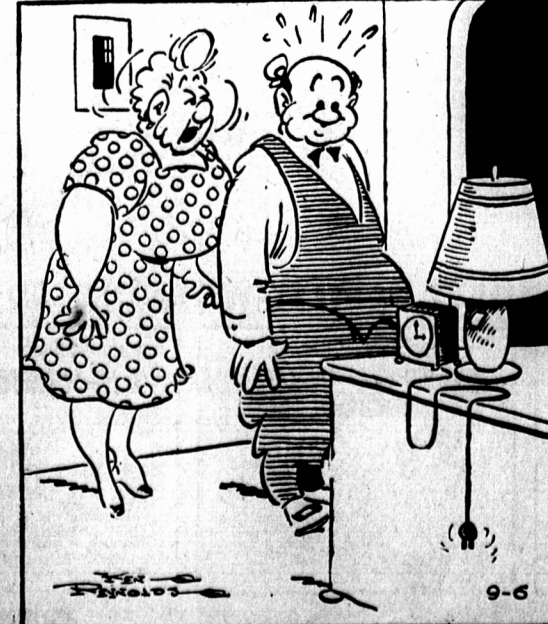
