Frank Robinson Makes Big Advance In NL Batting Race

NEW YORK (AP)—While three of the foremost contenders for major league batting championships were on the sidelines last week, Frank Robinson of Cincinnati did some robust hitting to move into a challenging position in the National League race.

Robinson, the 21-year-old outfielder who won his rookie-of-the-year award in 1956, has collected 11 hits in his last 21 tries. This 324 pace boosted his average to .327 and put him within striking distance of Stan Musial, the leader, and runner-up Willie Mays.

Musial, who has been out of the regular St. Louis lineup with a shoulder injury since Aug. 22, is expected to return to action tonight. He pinch-hit successfully in Sunday's game against Cincinnati and lifted his mark to .341.

Mays had 11 hits in 34 times at bat for New York Giants. He dropped a single point to .334. Willie has one of the most impressive offensive "lines" in the majors with 23 doubles, 20 triples, 32 homers, 92 runs batted in and

World Series Opens Oct. 2

NEW YORK (AP)—The 1957 world series will open Wednesday, Oct. 2, in the park of the American League pennant winner—most likely New York and possibly Chicago—commissioner Ford Frick announced Monday.

The first two games, as usual, will be played in the American League park, the next three in the home park of the National League champions. Games Nos. 6 and 7, if necessary, will be played in the American League park.

For the first time in 11 years, there is a strong possibility of the world series combatants taking time off for travel.

In case of an east-west world series, for instance one between the Yankees and Milwaukee Braves, or one between the White Sox and Brooklyn Dodgers—there will be a day of travel after the second and fifth games. In case of an all-east or all-west series one between St. Louis and

Chicago, for instance—there will be no intervening days off.

Games will start at 1 p.m. local time as in the past. The games will be nationally televised by NBC under the five-year, \$16,250,000 contract signed last January.

Prices will be the same as last year—\$10.00 for box seats, \$7 reserved, \$4 standing room and \$2 bleachers.

Should the American League race end in a standoff, there will be a one-game playoff, on Monday, Sept. 30, with the series opening on the scheduled date, Oct. 2. Should the National League race end in a tie, there will be a best-of-three game playoff, starting Monday.

"In that case," said Frick, "the start of the world series will have to be postponed to either Thursday, Oct. 3 or Friday, Oct. 4. It all depends on which team wins the American League pennant."

Eight Countries In 3rd Global World Series

DETROIT (AP)—Baseball teams from eight countries will arrive here Wednesday for the third annual global world series of baseball.

Few Changes Are Planned For Canadiens This Year

MONTREAL (CP)—Coach Toe Blake of Montreal Canadiens made it plain Monday there will be a minimum of monkeying with the National Hockey League club that has won the Stanley Cup the two seasons he has been the pilot.

The club opens training camp next Monday.

"We will start the workouts with our forward lines intact," said Blake following a luncheon for newspaper, radio and TV men. "We plan to carry four centres and are pretty well set for six defencemen."

Since clubs can carry 18 players, exclusive of goalies, until Dec. 1, there may be a couple of openings. There are also prospects of battles for positions by two or three of the less firmly established regulars.

Blake indicated the best chances for newcomers are on the wing positions. The most likely candidate appears to be Marcel Bonin, rugged leftwinger. He was just turned 36 last month, is only seven goals short of an unprecedented 500.

Blake's rundown of the other clubs: "Chicago Black Hawks should show the biggest improvement and could easily make the playoffs."

Jacques Plante will be back in goal. Candidates for relief or emergency work in the nets include veteran Gerry McNeil, from Royals, and Glen Davis and Ed Johnson.
