## Liturgical Institute Session Opening Here

Clergy and laity attending the three-day Liturgical Institute being held at the Basilica Recreation Centre will undertake a study in depth of the liturgy of the Catholic Church. Keynote speaker at the opening session last night was Father Clifford Howell, S.J. The framework for Father Howell's talk "The Aim To Be Considered Above All-Else" was the Vatican Council's Article 14 on Sacred Liturgy which says in part that "full and active participation by all people of the Church" is the primary aim of the liturgy. In referring to the theme of the Institute, "Mind and Heart

## 40 PER CENT UNCARED-FOR Maternal Care Report Is Issued In Britain

LONDON (CP)—At least 40 per cent of the world's mothers receive no professional care during pregnancy and labor, Sir John Peel, a British gynaecologist, said Tuesday.

"The standard of care that any country gives its expectant mothers and children reflects the state of civilization to which that country has advanced," said Sir John, surgeon-gynaecologist to the Queen.

He was introducing a report on maternal care around the world as seen through the training and practice of midwives. The result of five years' work sifting information from 174 countries, it was produced by a study group set up by the International Federation of Gynaecologists and Obstetricians and the International Confederation of Midwives.

Published today, the report gives data on 75 per cent of the world's population, excluding China.

**SOME FIGURES LACKING**  
The figure of 40 per cent uncared-for mothers is probably a "considerable underestimate," Sir John told a press conference. Statistics were incomplete on most of the emergent African countries and totally lacking for the vast jungle regions of Latin America.

Information on Canada's maternal care was provided by the School of Nursing, University of Alberta; the Canadian Nurses' Association, Ottawa, and the ministry of national health and welfare.

The report shows that the Soviet Union leads the world in the ratio of doctors and midwives to population—one to 600 population in the case of doctors, one to 900 for midwives.

On the final two days of their visit the group toured Regina, the Capital City of the Province. The tour included a visit to the RCMP Barracks, which is a major Canadian training centre; the Museum of Natural History and the official flag-lowering ceremonies at the Provincial Legislative Buildings.

### Former Corporal Pleads Guilty

KINGSTON (CP) — Harry L. Sutherland, 32, a former RCMP corporal now serving a five-year sentence in Collins Bay penitentiary here, Tuesday received additional terms when he pleaded guilty to two charges of armed robbery.

He was given an additional nine months for the armed theft of \$3,000 from the Royal Bank of Canada at Stewiacke, N.S., about 50 miles from Halifax, on Nov. 13, 1964; and a concurrent one-year term for stealing \$4,500 from the Bank of Nova Scotia in Westville, N.S., about 100 miles north of Halifax.

The five-year term now being served at Collins Bay was also for armed robbery. He pleaded guilty April 25 to stealing \$8,900 from the Bank of Nova Scotia in Trenton, N.S.

Sutherland was dismissed from the RCMP the day he was charged with the Trenton holdup.

### Campbell States Views On Campaign

Premier Alex Campbell today commented on a statement made recently by Alderman Kenneth Dear of Toronto who headed a campaign to keep Maritimers from moving into Toronto.

Mr. Dear had told Toronto Mayor Philip Givens that unemployed Maritimers were coming to Toronto and living in slums on welfare. He also said they were taking public housing from long-time Toronto residents.

"Obviously Alderman Kenneth Dear has not done his homework in making such a statement," said Premier Campbell.

Premier Campbell said he wondered if Mr. Dear has considered a savings to the city of Toronto of the education costs which we in the Maritimes have paid concerning our young people who moved to the larger centers and find their place within the industrial and cultural life of his city.

"I imagine my sister, who now lives in Toronto, will be amazed by Alderman Dear's statement," commented Premier Campbell.

Mayor Givens today stated in Toronto, "I don't think we should build walls around our city. What are we going to have — vigilantes at the city limits watching for people and telling them they can't come in if they've got Newfie licence plates?"

Alderman Dear sought the endorsement of the Mayor and the board of control for a brief which he plans to submit to Maritime premiers later this month urging them to warn their residents of Toronto's housing shortage.

But Mayor Givens and three of four controllers turned him down.
