

# Abbie Intermediates In 3-0 Win Over Holman's

The Abbies Intermediates, playing smart defensive ball behind the 5-hit pitching of Red MacKenzie, shut out the Holman Intermediates at the Recreation Centre diamond in Summerside yesterday afternoon by the score of 3-0. Only once did the Holman aggregation bunch their hits off MacKenzie, and that was in the sixth inning when they cracked out three successive singles, but air-tight defensive work prevented a score. Syl Bernard was out at the plate, and the Abbie catcher, Willis Hennessey went to the hospital with a broken nose as a result of the collision of runner and catcher, but Hennessey held the ball completing the play. Later Pius Gallant was run down between third and home, LeClair making the tag, and the third baseman's quick whip to shortstop Whitlock at third caught Harris sliding into the hot corner. It was an exhibition of defensive baseball at its best. In addition to this LeClair pulled down a foul fly from the bat of Harris in the fourth, after running up a steep grade, and Whitlock's stab of Harris' bid for a safe single in the eighth was another smart play.

Dee LeFursey, kid pitcher on the mound for Holman's, did an exceptionally fine chore considering it was his first appearance in Island League ball. He was touched for eleven hits but the Abbies were kept off the score sheet for seven innings, getting two of their tallies in the eighth, and one, a well-tagged home run to deep centre by Charlie Ryan in the ninth. Whitlock and Williams led the visiting slickers with two hits apiece. Vance Harris, sensational youngster just breaking into fast company, was tops for C. & B. with a single and double, besides being robbed by Whitlock of a third bingle.

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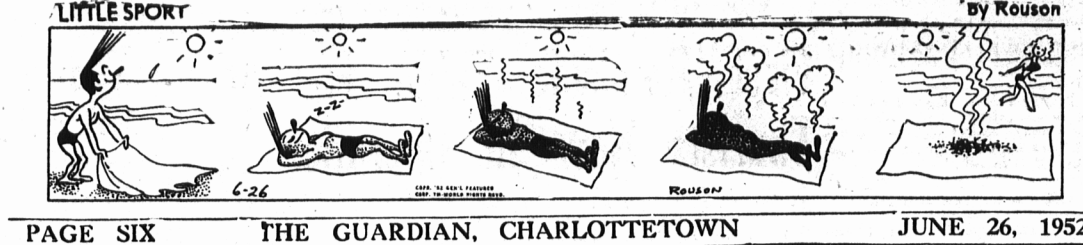
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## ANNUAL MEETING

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# Joey Maxim Retains Title In TKO Win Over Sugar Ray Robinson

NEW YORK, June 25 — (AP) — Joey Maxim dramatically saved his world light heavyweight title tonight after taking a early round beating when Sugar Ray Robinson was unable to come out for the 14th round of the title bout in the steaming 103-degree heat of Yankee Stadium.

Reeling to his corner in sheer exhaustion after the 13th, Robinson's bid for ring immortality as a triple champion ended on his stool in the 14th round. It was the first time in the brilliant 137-bout career of Robinson that the Harlem Sugar Dandy had been stopped. The soggy sweatbox that was Yankee Stadium had already expected its toll of referee Ruby Goldstein during the intro fight before a huge shirt-sleeved crowd. Overcome by the heat, Goldstein had to give way to sub referee Ray Miller in the 11th.

The heat and the 15 1-2 pounds he gave away to pal Joey from Cleveland suddenly caught up with Robinson in the 13th. The crowd was stunned when Sugar Ray, the sure-footed dancing master of the first 10 rounds, fell flat on his face in the 13th as he threw a wild haymaker right. The sight of Robinson on his back from a missed punch was an indication of his desperate plight.

As the 13th ended he collapsed wobbling against the ropes near a neutral corner and had to be dragged to his own stool. Dr. Alexander Schiff, ringside physician, climbed into the ring and asked Robinson: "Can you go on?"

The middleweight champ replied: "I can't get up on my feet. I'm all in." Dr. Schiff then signalled referee Miller it was all over on Robinson's 13th round. Dr. Schiff said "Robinson suffered from heat exhaustion similar to that which effected referee Goldstein early in the fight."

Robinson was a cool artist of perfection in the early stages and looked as if he would laugh off the weight advantage the 30-year-old Maxim held. But it finally caught up with him this sizzling evening.

Weighing only 157 1-2 to Maxim's 173 in a second weight-in for this bout that was postponed 48 hours Monday because of rain, Sugar Ray outsped Maxim to pile up a wide early lead. Time after time he danced into the attack with his slinging combinations.

Sugar Ray carried the fight for Robinson according to the reports and had Maxim soundly licked but wore himself out in doing it and succumbed to the 102 degree heat at the end of the thirteenth.

Robinson, of course, was forced to do the fighting. He was the challenger and was 15 pounds lighter than the champion. Possibly old Doc Kearns, Maxim's manager knew that Robinson could not keep up his early pace in the terrific heat which forced referee Ruby Goldstein to retire Robinson in the tenth. Perhaps the cagey Doc told Maxim to take it easy knowing Robinson would wear himself out. If he did it's a feat in his hat. To us the fight did not prove anything and we would like to see them re-match for a bout this fall.
