

discrepancies in the accounts which have come to hand, but as to the main features of the misfortunes there is no doubt.

Our Dublin correspondent telegraphs this morning: "The passengers to Ireland, who came on later in the day, state that when the explosion occurred the mail train burst into flames. Twenty-three persons were destroyed—burned to cinders, and their bodies cannot be identified. Among the killed are Lord and Lady Farnham. Lord Castlerosse and his children escaped. His Lordship was sitting in the same carriage with the Duchess of Abercorn, who also escaped. Several ladies were among the dead. The mail boat reached Kings-town this morning at one o'clock, when a sad scene was witnessed. On luggage being brought ashore which nobody claimed, the inference of friends was, of course, that the owners were among the killed. The Duchess of Abercorn and her family (who were all safe) went at once to the Viceregal Lodge. Her Grace did not appear to be much injured.—The mails were all saved. Mr. and Lady Selwin-Ibbetson are among those who have arrived in Dublin safe, also Howth. Two elderly ladies, who were bound for Ireland, preferred returning to London—they were little hurt."

The Evening Mail gives an account of the accident by a gentleman who travelled in the carriage next to those that were consumed. The mail train, he says, struck two portions of the goods train in succession, which were coming down the incline at a greater speed than the mail was advancing. The shock was great. When he looked out he saw in front only a blazing mass. There was no cry or groan, and those killed must have died instantly. He saw but fourteen bodies. The Duchess of Abercorn and her daughters travelled in the carriage next to the engine to Chester; and there the mail van and three carriages were placed in front. Lord Farnham has no daughters, as some of the published accounts represent. The names of the ladies travelling in the compartments with him are unknown. No further names of the killed are known here."

Our Shrewsbury correspondent telegraphs:—"Twenty-three parcels of charred human remains were placed in Abberley church this morning to await the inquest.—Whether they are those of men or women, or even whether they are entire bodies, it is impossible to say. I have ascertained beyond doubt that Lord and Lady Farnham, Judge Berwick, Sir Nicholas and Lady Chinsky left Chester in the portion of the train which was burnt."

At the half-yearly meeting of the London and North-Western Railway Company, held at the Euston Station this morning, the Chairman (Mr. R. Moon), in moving the adoption of the report, said that the directors appeared before the meeting under very depressing circumstances, owing to the accident which occurred yesterday at Abberley, and by which nearly twenty of their fellow-creatures were killed. They had been striving to do all they could and now this misfortune came upon them. They had, however, the melancholy satisfaction of knowing that all that could be done had been done by them. All that science could do, all that a perfect system of signal could do, they had done. But this was no satisfaction to the friends and relatives of those who had suffered, and he would ask them for their sympathy with them in this the worst accident that ever occurred in the country.

THE ARRAIGNMENT OF WHELAN FOR THE MURDER OF HON. T. D. MCGEE.

OTTAWA, September 3, 1868. Chief Justice Richards took his seat at a few minutes after half-past nine in the morning. There was a considerable number of people waiting around the Court House, and inside the audience was about as large as that of yesterday. The Grand Jury retired, and in a few minutes returned into Court with a "true bill" against Patrick J. Whelan, for murder.

During the progress of the cord wood case, the Hon. J. H. Cameron, Hon. M. C. Cameron, accompanied by John O'Farrel, Esq., and Kenneth McKenzie, Esq., entered the Court, having driven up together about noon, and some little excitement was occasioned among the initiated by the understanding that Whelan would be arraigned for McGee's murder upon the first subsequent opportunity. The general expectation was satisfied by the entry about one o'clock (when the room was almost empty) of the Sheriff, followed by the prisoner, who was led in "nippers" by two policemen, and closely guarded by a strong party of the force. Upon his being placed in the dock—when his hands were freed—the attention of the small body of spectators was at once attracted towards him. He was neatly dressed in a complete suit of black, and evidently carefully costumed for the trying moment of his public re-appearance, having had his beard and moustache accurately trimmed and his wavy hair arranged with the glossiest precision. His appearance is less careworn than at the time of his committal, and his health seems to have improved under prison discipline. He took his seat with self-possession, bowed gravely and courteously to the governor of the gaol and his counsel, and unless it be for a slightly nervous twitching of his moustache, exhibited as much unconcern as any body present.

Seriously seeming to pay attention to the very interesting cordwood squabble pending, to which, indeed, even the combined genius of Messrs. Ross and Mosgrove were unable to lend the halo of sensation, he glanced over the strange array of faces round him, with just the natural interest of a recluse, to whom such imposing scenes had been for a long time unfamiliar, saluting each of his acquaintances as they caught his eye in turn. Altogether, he seems much improved (physically), during his retirement, and bore himself manfully throughout, displaying neither timidity nor effrontery. Standing up while the indictment was being read over by the Clerk, he did not wait until the conclusion to put in his plea, but upon the definite accusation of wilfully killing Mr. McGee, interrupted firmly and determinedly with the words "I deny the charge." At the conclusion of the indictment he emphatically repeated the same phrase, and a plea of not guilty was consequently recorded. On the question being put as to whether he was prepared to take his trial, he replied "I am ready whenever my learned Counsel are."

The Hon. J. H. Cameron, who desired the case to be gone into, (upon Mr. O'Reilly demanding that it should be proceeded with to-day,) and urged the impossibility of conducting defence immediately after the arraignment. On Saturday, he said, it might be practicable to have matters in readiness, but as there was no likelihood of completing the trial on one day, he preferred Monday, so as to avoid the adjournment over Sunday.—His Lordship having intimated that it would be necessary for the witnesses to be present, so that the court might proceed at 9 a. m. on Monday, Mr. O'Reilly on the part of the Crown, consented to the postponement, and after a short conference with the Hon. J. H. Cameron, the prisoner was removed.—Ottawa Times.

A GLIMMER OF FINDINGS OF SIR JOHN FRANKLIN.—News has been received from Dr. Hall, the gentlemen of an exploring turn of mind, who sailed out of New London some four or five years ago, to go in quest of Sir John Franklin. The doctor writes that he has found a clue which may lead to the desired discovery. Some Esquimaux tell him that they saw a party of white men carry a body on shore at a certain place, and lay it in a brick vault, which was afterwards cemented and covered with boulders. The doctor is inclined to think that this body is that of Sir John Franklin, but is going to find the vault, and satisfy himself before he returns. As the Esquimaux in the region in which the vault is situated are not very friendly, the doctor has hired five trustworthy seamen to go with him. He purposes to set out this fall.
