The Boston Provincialist regrets to learn that Daniel McNeill, of P. E. Island, fell from a building at Quincy, Mass., a few days ago, breaking his right arm and hurting his back. He is at present doing as well as might be expected. The Presbytery of P. E. Island will (D. V.) meet in Summerside on Wednesday 4th May at 11 a. m. The wind then changed clearing away the ice and the steamer reached Georgetown at six o'clock this morning. A FRIEND writes to the Summerside Pioneer that Mrs. R. Gordon, of Cascumpe Village, who died a short time ago (aged 94 years) during the last twelve months read over twice the New Testament and a book containing 42 sermons. She gave up the use of glasses some 30 years ago, and could read ordinary print without any assistance of that kind. She was the mother of ten sturdy sons, eight of whom are now living. The late Rev. Donald Gordon, who was stationed at Annapolis, N. S., and died there a few days ago, was one of her sons. She was in every respect an estimable woman, held in the highest esteem in the community. The following story, though it transpired some months ago, is, the Summerside Pioneer thinks, deserving of notice. A man residing in the vicinity of Lot 7, intending to have a jolly time on a certain festive occasion, wrote to Dr. Sanderson, of Summerside, ordering a case of whiskey, which was forwarded to a near station. Receiving it on arrival, the man took out a bottle to keep him company on his home journey and proceeded on his way rejoicing. Next morning on opening the case to abstract a flask for the customary "eye opener," fancy his consternation on finding his eleven bottles of "mountain dew" turned into bricks. DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Debates and Proceedings.

OTTAWA, April 26. When the orders of the day were called, Sir John rose and paid his tribute to the memory of the late Robert Moffatt. Hon. Peter Mitchell endorsed all that Sir John had said. Mr. Blake reminded Mr. Foster that the fisheries correspondence had not yet been brought down. The Minister replied that the correspondence made available within the past few days would be brought down, printed with previous correspondence, and that a few days' delay was required for printing. Messrs. Blake and Mitchell thought this was not a good reason for delay. Mr. Freeman resumed the Home Rule debate by a vigorous speech, censuring severely the attitude of some Irish leaders, but approved of a measure of home rule and would support the resolution. Mr. Wood, of Westmorland, would support the McCarthy amendment, but did not mean by this to express hostility to local self-government for Ireland. The vote on McCarthy's amendment was taken. The amendment was lost, 133 to 49. Davin proposed an amendment regretting that coercion is found necessary, and expressing the hope that some sort of Home Rule in Ireland will be adopted which will not bring about disintegration of the Empire. This amendment was lost by a vote of 59 to 128. Ministers McDonald, Carling, Bowell, Foster, Pope, White and McLellan voted yes. Langevin, Caron, Costigan, Chappleau and Thompson voted no. Sir Charles was absent.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

TUESDAY, April 26. AFTERNOON SESSION. The Charlottetown Waterworks Act 1887, was read a second time. Hon. Mr. McLeod explained the chief provisions of the Bill, as amended at the meeting of the citizens. The Bill was read clause by clause. Progress reported. The Bill amending the Education Act was read a third time on the following division:— For—Messrs. Sullivan, Ferguson, McLeod, Arsenault, Bentley, Lefurgy, Prowse, A. J. McDonald, Gordon, Blake, Underhay, H. L. McDonald, Shaw, Kelly, A. McLean, John McLean, Dr. Gillis—17. Against—Messrs. Farquharson, Sinclair, J. R. McLean, Martin Bell, Forbes, Wise, Mathezon—8.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL. TUESDAY, April 26. The adjourned debate on the Subway Bill was resumed. Hon. Mr. Clow submitted the following amendment to the amendment of Hon. Mr. Laird:— Resolved, That all the words after "that," in the first resolution in the amendment, be struck out, and the following inserted: "This House is of opinion that no contract should be entered into by the Government unless a provision or clause is inserted in the bill to withhold the payment of any money or debentures to the contractors till the Government have successfully operated the Subway for one year, and that this House do resolve itself into a committee of the whole to take this bill into consideration."

After a short discussion the amendment was ruled out of order by the President, and the bill was thrown out, only Hon. Messrs. Nicholson, Clow and Martin voting to go into committee to consider it; all the rest voting against it.
