Editorial Notes.

The Russian budget for 1887 shows a deficit of £782,530 against £4,263,875, as estimated.

The Farmer's Review, of Chicago, referring to the wheat crop in the United States, says the shortage this year will amount to 40,000,000 bushels as compared with last year.

A recent London cable reports that Manitoba No. 1 hard is realizing the highest price of all wheats in the Liverpool markets, bringing 9s. 4d.

Reports from eighty-two counties of Minnesota and Dakota show a net decrease as compared with last year's wheat crop of 30 per cent, which would make the present wheat crop of Minnesota and Dakota 55,000,000 to 60,000,000 bushels.

It looks as though the present winter would be a hard one for the people of Maine. The Bangor Commercial says that throughout the State the potatoes are rotting both in the ground and out of it.

The Quebec interprovincial resolutions were drafted and passed with a good deal of noise and clamor. The conference occupied much time and cost a large sum of money.

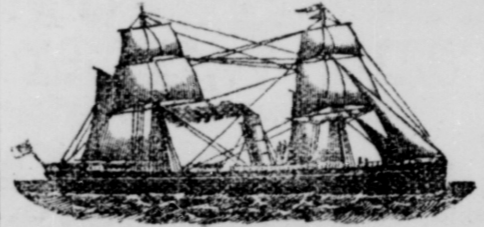
