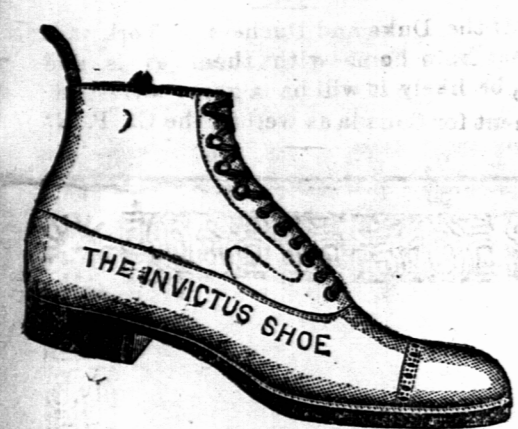

Last night the Caledonian Club presented the Highland Boy's Brigade with a very handsome set of kettle drums supplementing the previous gift of a set of bagpipes. The presentation was made in the Club room by the Chief, Major Stewart, in the presence of many members of the Club and a number of invited guest ladies and gentlemen. The gift was eloquently acknowledged by Rev. T. F. Fullerton. The following gentlemen upon invitation of the chair addressed the gathering in turn: Messrs. John MacPhee, D. Small, T. C. James, L. W. Watson, R. MacMillan, John MacMillan, Charles MacGregor and Captain John MacDonald. Piper Ferguson played some selections upon the magnificent pipes of the Brigade and Master Charles Webster danced the Highland fling very excellently. Lieut. Alex. McKinnon called for three cheers for the Club which were given by the boys with heart and soul and sturdy lungs. The proceedings closed with the National Anthem and three cheers for the King. The boys of the brigade headed by Piper Ferguson and their own piper, presented a martial appearance as they marched to and from the rooms and were the subject of much enthusiastic praise.

**EASTERN NOTES.**—While not wishing to interfere in the discussion about the demerits or merits of the weed Ragwort. I may say that considerable of it is found in this section but, cattle disease and hay-fever are unknown to us. The Ragwort originated on the Baltic Road some thirty years ago, on the north east corner of land then owned by Daniel Melunian now owned by Albert Garrett, and spread rapidly in all directions. It was feared at one time it would monopolize all the land, but its spread is not now so rapid and it has almost disappeared where it first started. Pasturing sheep where it grows is an effectual remedy. Some rain is falling at last and not before the time as never since the Island was first settled was there such a scarcity of water. Wells are dry in all directions and springs that never failed before give water no longer. Fishing is about wound up for the season unless a few small codfish which may be caught later on. On the whole it has been a poor summer for the fishermen. An immense school of dog-fish has filled the Gulf for some time rendering fishing nearly impossible where the weather suitable. One solitary seiner from Gloucester cruised round here for a few times towing her seine boat, but she found nothing to seine and has left. Milton Young and Sewall Baker have left for Poland Springs, Maine.—John Nichol and niece of Annandale have been visiting friends in the East recently.—Elijah McVane had a sale of his stock and novelties recently and realized fair prices, his health is not as vigorous as formerly and he intends going south for some time at least.—D. A. Bruce paid us a flying visit here recently.—Leonard Whale left for his home in England on the 30th inst.

A baseball game was played at Victoria Park yesterday afternoon between teams chosen from the commercial men now in the City. The two nines represented the "Grip Men" and the "Trunk Men" respectively. The game was very heartily contested and much interest was added by the coaching, which was greatly enjoyed by the spectators. 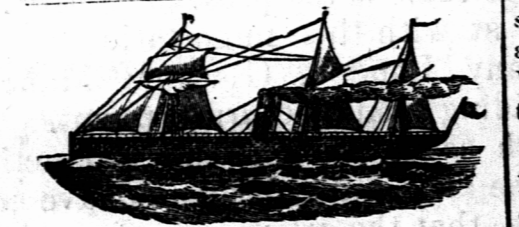
