

THE PRESBYTERIAN SYNOD. Interesting Topics Discussed.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON. The Synod decided to meet next year at Pictou. Rev. E. Smith, Convener of the Agitation Committee, presented a very interesting report. He showed, however, that in consequence of its very success, the demands were beginning to exceed the receipts. In view of these facts, Mr. Smith presented a plan whereby the various assisted fields in the Synod may be worked more efficiently and economically. This plan was referred to the Committees interested, with the view of securing action of the General Assembly on the matter.

A lively discussion on the motion to appoint a Synodical Evangelist then took place. The hour of adjournment prevented a vote being taken, but the temper of the Synod seemed to be unfavorable to the appointment.

THE EVENING SESSION was devoted to Foreign Missions. An excellent report was presented by Rev. A. Falconer, Convener of the F. M. Committee, showing marked progress in the mission field, both in the New Hebrides and in Trinidad. This was followed by an admirable address from Rev. A. W. Thompson, one of the Trinidad missionaries. Mr. Thompson showed that this field had now reached the stage in which they were about to form native congregations among the coolies, that they were training native ministers and catechists, and were moving forward to immediate work. Not only in Trinidad but in New Hebrides over 200,000 Hindus were brought in the Providence of God, into our hands, in the West Indies and Demerara. The call to this church to evangelize them was clamant. Mr. Thompson made an earnest appeal for a vigorous forward movement along the line. He was followed by Mr. J. B. C. P., a native of St. Lucia, now a student at the Presbyterian College, Halifax. Mr. Cropper spoke of the immense benefit which the Mission had conferred upon the coolies, the gratitude they had shown as testified by their large and liberal contributions for the support of the Gospel, and urged the church not only to hold the ground which they had already taken, but to go forward believing that God who called them would enable them to do the work.

THURSDAY MORNING. The first business was a discussion on the boundary line of certain Presbyteries. This was disposed of by a resolution to refer the whole matter of arranging the Presbyteries of the Maritime Province to a Committee to report to next Synod. A petition in regard to the mode of appointing the committee of the church was after full discussion, disposed of by a motion requesting Presbyteries to nominate representatives on those committees and forward them to the Agent of the Church, Halifax. The discussion upon the regulations of the Aged and Infirm Ministry Fund was then resumed and continued up to the hour of adjournment.

This evening at 7:30 o'clock, the important subject of Home Missions will occupy the Synod. When it is known that Rev. Dr. Robertson, Moderator of the General Assembly, and the visiting Superintendent of the whole Synod is to speak, it need hardly be said that the meeting will be one of no ordinary interest. Those who have heard Dr. Robertson before will be sure to be present, and those who have not will miss a treat if they stay away.
