DIVIDEND.—The Merchants' Bank of P. E. Island has declared a half-yearly dividend, at the rate of 7 per cent., on its paid up capital stock, payable on and after Thursday, December 3rd.

Says the Montreal Gazette: As an indication of the improved feeling which has taken place in the cotton trade of the country, we hear of a sale of \$30,000 Dundas Cotton Company bonds at 10 1/2.

REV. E. S. W. PENTREATH is spoken of as a very likely candidate for the rectorship of St. Paul's, Halifax. Mr. Pentreath is at present rector of Christ church, Winnipeg, and was formerly assistant editor of the Church Guardian.

The new first-class car for the Cape Tormentine Branch Railway is now on the siding at Sackville Station. It will be used on the road in a few days and will be a great accommodation to those travelling between Sackville and Bay Verte.

The New York World says: "They are getting ready to explore the Arctic regions again. The Arctic regions are those uninhabited regions of ice and water, where courageous souls go in the interest of impractical and useless information."

The United States coast survey reports great earthquake waves on the Pacific Coast at San Francisco, as indicated in the coast survey gauge. These waves were noted on the 22nd inst., between 1 and 8 p.m. They were 35 minutes apart and were as great as those observed during the great upheaval in Java.

As showing the rapid and material progress that is being made by Toronto, the value of buildings erected during the year is \$2,344,300, as compared with \$2,033,245 last year, and this notwithstanding the fact that the strike of the bricklayers and laborers stopped all building operations for nearly three months.

A VITICULTURAL official of California, who has just returned from a tour through the State, confirms previous reports of a short wine crop. The year's vintage will not exceed 7,500,000 gallons, which, with 3,500,000 gallons of old wine, makes the total quantity in the State at the present time only 11,000,000 gallons.

The dissolution of Parliament in November is a very unusual occurrence. In three centuries it has happened only three times, viz., in 1558, 1701, and 1868.

The Montreal Witness asks:—Is Mr. Blake, the pronouncer of the murdered Scott's funeral oration in Parliament, going to lead a party based on sympathy with Riel?

When O'Donovan Rossa went to Louisville, Kentucky, to lecture last spring he used a hard-hearted whiskey dealer \$82 for liquor, and an iron-hearted constable seized the dynamiter's body for the debt, and was about to thrust him in goal. THE SMALLPOX.

NEW CASES. Mr. Redmond, who nursed his wife before she went to hospital, is unwell—has a violent, light attack. Mrs. David Ingles is reported with premonitory symptoms—her case is yet doubtful.

DEATHS. Owen McMahon and John P. Larkins died to-day. Malcolm Steele died last evening at 7 o'clock.

CONDITION OF THE PATIENTS. Mrs. Forrest is very low. Mr. B. Dawson is better. Mr. Bourke in Quarantine Hospital is doing well.

THE SITUATION. The following resolutions were last evening telegraphed to the leading newspapers in Canada, and to the Associated Press, at New York:—

Resolved, That the Report of the several sub-committees appointed to inspect and report upon the state of this city, as to vaccination, is very satisfactory. From this Report, made by thoroughly reliable citizens, it appears that out of a population of over 12,000, only 1,122 had not been vaccinated up to yesterday morning.

That since then, by the exertions of the Government vaccinator, Dr. Conroy, and the medical gentlemen who kindly consented personally to visit the homes of those not vaccinated, and vaccinated them, only 50 per cent of those so reported remain undone up to this time—Wednesday evening, 6 o'clock—and they report that by the end of this week all the population of the city will have been vaccinated.

We learn with pleasure from His Worship the Mayor, who reports on the authority of Sister St. Thomas, nurse in charge, that the present state of the Hospital is entirely satisfactory.

No new cases have been reported since Monday, and we congratulate our fellow citizens that nothing that can reasonably be done is being omitted to stay the spread of the disease, which is now well under control.

That the facts as contained in the foregoing resolution be reported in the daily papers, under the authority of this Committee.

NO CASE AT SOUTHPORT. It was reported last evening that a case of smallpox existed at Southport, and that the victim was Mr. Charles Chandler. Dr. Warburton visited the patient this morning and pronounced him to be suffering from vaccination fever only.

SIR.—The report current on the street to-day, that Mr. Charles Chandler had the smallpox, is utterly untrue and without any foundation whatever, and only arose from confusion with the case of the sailor at the marine hospital across the river. Also, that all country physicians be requested to meet the residents of each school district and have them vaccinated—a school house would be a suitable place. There ought to be at least one member of the Board of Health appointed in each school district, even were small pox never to visit our Island. There is not one member in Orwell, Uzzig, or east for miles.

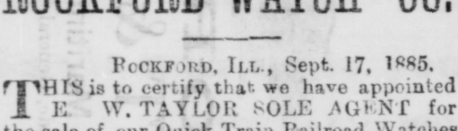
