Town Of Summerside Recaps '64 Activities

Summerside continued its growth in both residential and commercial structures during the past year, with building permits for 1964 totalling nearly \$90,000.

New streets were opened in the north end of the town and new municipal services installed. General improvements were also made in other areas of the town.

Among the year's highlights were efforts to commemorate the 1964 Centennial including the erection of plaques, pennants and flower pots along the streets and a waterfall effect fountain in Memorial Park.

Educational was the highest single spending department of the town budget. Education costs to the town for 1964 reached the unprecedented high of \$275,750.

Year-end operating deficits of former years in the water and sewerage department have been corrected through an order from the P.E.I. Public Utilities Commission, which set new and increased interim water rates for a tentative period until March 1, 1965.

ADB AID

The Atlantic Development Board has agreed to install, at a cost to the board of \$100,000, water and sewerage systems in an area which is expected to serve as a site for industrial development in the future for both Summerside and St. Eleanors.

Great progress was made during the year to modernize the overall street light system.

Intoxicated Driving Case Is Dismissed

John Patrick Morris of Borden, charged with having the licence and operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated, had his case dismissed yesterday when he appeared before Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, in the Queen's County Magistrate's Court.

In dismissing the charge Magistrate Johnston said he had given careful consideration to the evidence. Two witnesses had testified that the accused had only two drinks of beer in the evening. When the accused was found he had parked his car a few feet from the side of the road, had the parking lights on and was wrapped in a blanket with his head out the window showing that he had no intention to drive the car at that time. He said it was a border line case but when there is the doubt, the accused must be given the benefit of it.

Magistrate Johnston added that the arresting officer had been justified in making the arrest when he came upon the parked car and its occupants.

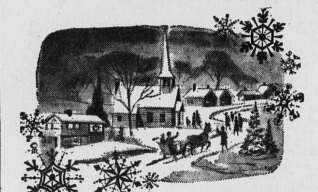
