Hawks Blank Habs 7-0; Nesterenko Gets Three

CHICAGO (AP) — Chicago Black Hawks exploded for five goals in the second period Sunday night and skated off with a 7-0 National Hockey League victory over Montreal Canadiens. The triumph, which broke a three-game losing streak, marked Chicago into sole possession of first place. They had been tied with the Canadiens, who fell to third a point behind Detroit. The Red Wings vaulted over Montreal in the fight battle by beating New York 6-5 Sunday night. Chicago took a 1-0 lead in the first period on Chico Maki's 13th goal of the year but the Hawks appeared to be in trouble early in the second period as the Canadiens sent wave after wave in against goalie Glenn Hall. However, the Hawks' margin increases to 2-0 at 6:33 when Pierre Pilote's shot from the point during a power play bounced off several legs before

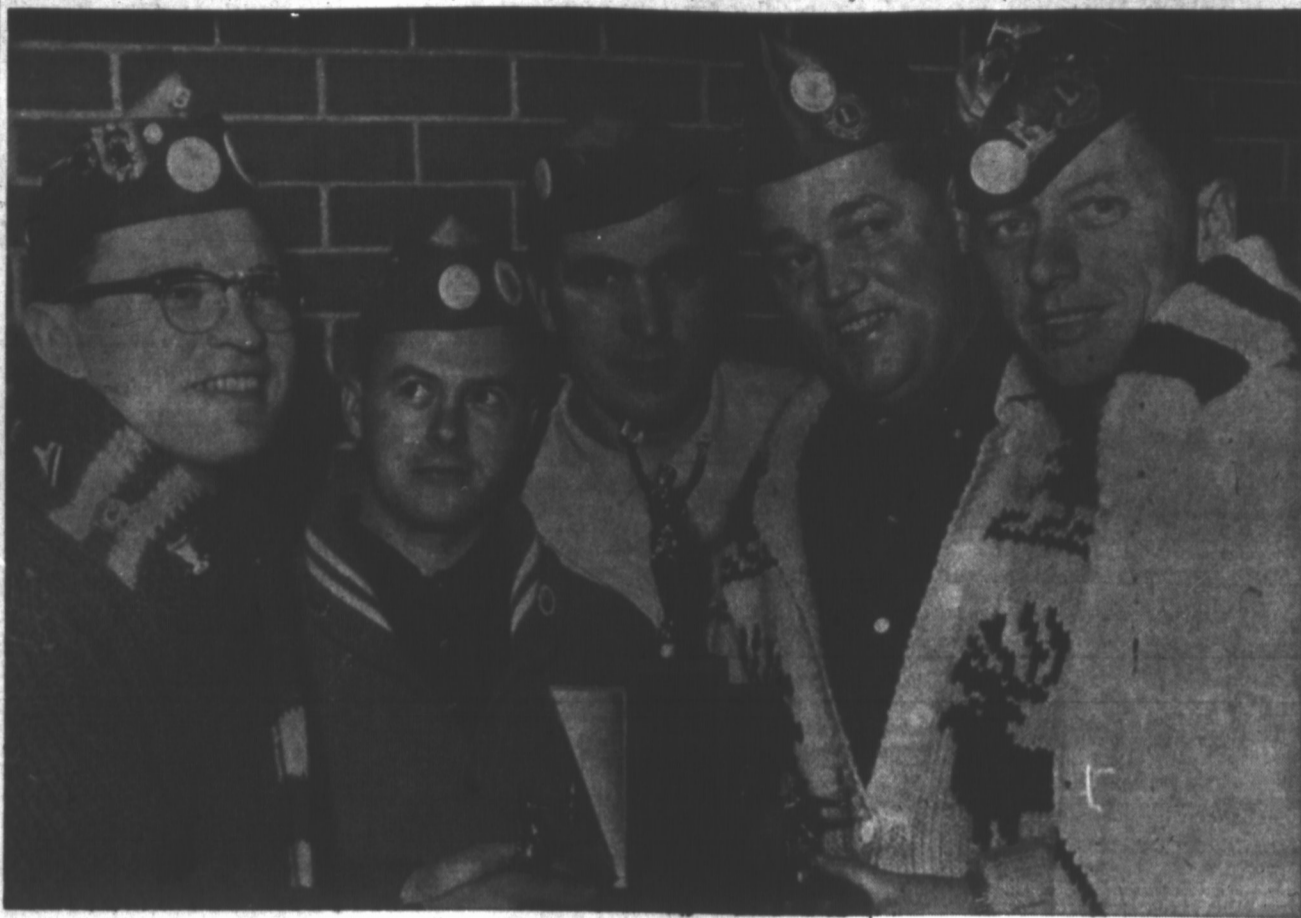

Toronto Ties Boston; Wings Edge Rangers

BOSTON (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs roared back from a 1-0 deficit to score all their goals in the second period and tie the Boston Bruins 3-3 in a National Hockey League game Sunday night. Dave Keon scored the tying goal on an unassisted effort when he stole a loose puck and connected on a 20-foot backhand at 19:32 of the second period. The goal capped a flurry during which the teams bunched four goals in a span of less than five minutes. Boston's Murray Oliver reached the coveted 20-goal plateau for the third straight year at 14:54. Frank Mahovlich of Toronto reached 20 for the fifth successive season at 17:17. Then Reg Fleming scored on a 30-foot slapshot off a drop pass at 19:04 before Keon pulled his team even once again. Ab McDonald clicked for the home forces at 17:44 of the opening period on a partly screened 15-footer around defenceman Alan Stanley's legs. Carl Brewer got the equalizer in the second period while the Maple Leaf's were shorthanded. The goalies were stars in the last 20 minutes. Toronto's Terry Sawchuk, who ended up with 43 saves, made 15 in that span while rookie Jack Norris had 17.

DETROIT 6 NEW YORK 5
NEW YORK (AP) — Parker MacDonald and Alex Delvecchio scored 17 seconds apart in the third period, capping a Detroit rally that gave Red Wings a 6-5 victory over New York Rangers Sunday night and kept their National Hockey League title drive rolling. The victory, Detroit's seventh in the last eight games, left the Wings in the thick of the three-team race for first place with 72 points. The loss mathematically ended the Rangers' playoff hopes. The Red Wings trailed 5-3 after New York's Doug Robinson scored his second goal of the game early in the third period. They struck back as Pit Martin beat New York goalie Marcel Paille.

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St. Dunstan's Trips UNB; MacMillan Sets Record

St. Dunstan's University Saints returned to this city yesterday with at least a few things clearer after splitting their two games in Fredericton. — Their unbeaten record of 9 straight wins came to an abrupt end against a hustling St. Thomas club Friday night and eclipsed any illusions of invincibility. — their ace forward, Billy MacMillan, captured the MIHL scoring race for the second year in a row. His two goals and six assists over the weekend gave him a season total of 23-19-41, shattering Dick Tingley's old mark of 38 points. — their performance Saturday night against U.N.B., when they were down two goals at one point, and came back to win 6-6, proved conclusively that this is the team to represent the Maritimes at the Canadian finals in Winnipeg. The Saints' effort in the UNB game started out as an exact duplicate of the play against St. Thomas — horrendous. Playing without Denis DeCarufel, who is nursing a shoulder injury, St. Dunstan's appeared shaky and disorganized, especially in their own end, and UNB's positional style of play caught the Saints off guard. Garnet Stairs had given the Red Devils a 1-0 lead on a tip in shot at 10:30, when seconds later, Jeff Leach was brought down from behind on a clear breakaway. Referee Percy Brennan awarded him a penalty shot at 11:47. His quick wrist shot from 15 feet beat MacNeil cleanly. The UNB rout was dispelled briefly on Andre Gelinax's first of two goals with Mike Kelly and Rex MacCarville drawing assists. That marker came at 17:48. Although visibly nervous at the start of the game, George MacNeil of StDU saved on 13 shots in that first frame. He was particularly sharp on labelled drives by Martin Winslow and Jim Morell, who each had excellent chances to score from close in. Hustling Andre Gelinax put the Saints ahead for good at 9:54 with Kelly and MacCarville again getting assists. Whitlock scored his second of the night with neat passing play with Billy MacMillan at 17:32. George Monaghan made it 6-3 going into the third period with a backhand shot from the side of the net. SDU's 16-6 shot margin indicated the territorial play advantage in the second period. **KELLY SCORES**
The Red Devils came on strong in the third period and

Darrel LeBlanc's goal at 1:09 provided the spark for his second of the night at 7:55, making the score 6-3. Just when UNB seemed to be pressing the hardest, Mike Kelly assisted on a flawless effort with assists from Pollock and MacMillan. Two minutes later Maurice Roy scored his thirteenth of the season despite some protests from the UNB defense corps. Austin Duquette ended the scoring at 17:10 to make the final total read 8-6. At the 18.15 mark Coach Pete Kelly of UNB yanked John Wrigley from the nets in favour of an extra forward, but the Red Devils failed to score. — On the blue line: Dr. A.P. Stupart, President of the MIHL, presented the Halifax Herald trophy to SDU captain Vince Mulligan at the start of the third period, remarking that it was only the second time in 37 years that St. Dunstan's has won the coveted title. — Maurice Roy ended up as the second highest scorer for St. Dunstan's with 13 goals and 14 assists. Last year he had five goals and no assists. — SDU's offensive effort this year amounts to 87 goals compared with last year's total of 59, a difference of 28. The Saints will hold practices Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, and then will leave for Winnipeg by air on Thursday. Their two games are scheduled for Friday and Saturday, and then they will fly home Sunday.

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
