DECEMBER 28, 1895. THE RESULT IN MONTREAL CENTRE.

The disgraceful fact of the rejection of Sir William Hingston and the election of Jimmy McShane by the electors of Montreal Centre is not at all wonderful nor at all significant of the feeling of the people of Canada as a whole.

His electioneering acts and "human devices" are yet powerful. To the Canadian French voters it is natural to follow a Canadian French leader.

Mr. Laurier and his organs have filled them with the idea that the Liberal party are for separate schools and justice to the minority in Manitoba, and that the "Orangeists" led by Sir McKenzie Bowell, of necessity enemies of the French, their race and religion, are only pretending to enforce the judgment of the Privy Council.

The returns of the election show that McShane owes his election to the vote of French Canadians, and that the Irish Roman Catholic and Protestant vote is in favor of the Government.

To these causes, and not to the National Policy, under which Montreal has amazingly grown and prospered, are to be attributed the unfortunate result of the election.

We cannot believe that Montreal Centre is, in any sense, typical of constituencies throughout Canada, or that the people generally prefer such men as "Jimmy" McShane before such men as Sir William Hingston.
