GOOD YOUNG PORKERS.—At the market today Mr. Charles Irving, of Cherry Valley, had two pigs on sale which tipped the scales at 311 and 324 lbs., respectively. The pigs were 3 months and 3 days old. They were bought by William Seller at the rate of 54 cents a pound.

BOSTON'S UNEMPLOYED.—There was a big meeting of unemployed men in Faneuil Hall, Boston, on Tuesday. The meeting was quiet and orderly. Frank J. Price, of the New York World, made a speech, in which he offered \$100 to anyone who could find one hundred non-English-speaking auditors in the hall, but he found no takers.

MANY CONVERTS.—As a result of the revival meetings held in the Methodist Church at Summerside for the past five or six weeks, some twenty-five converts were received into fellowship with the church at the evening service last Sabbath evening. At the Baptist Church, the same evening, six were baptized by Rev. Mr. Bentley and received into the membership of the church.—Farmer.

ISLANDERS LOST.—All hope of the Gloucester schooner Flash and her crew has been abandoned, according to a late despatch from that place. For six weeks the owners have waited anxiously for news of her but none has been received. The Flash was on a voyage to Newfoundland for a cargo of frozen herrings. She carried a crew of six men, including James Ahern, James Donovan and Simon Gillis of P. E. Island. Ahern was thirty-four years of age, Donovan thirty-one, and Gillis thirty-two. Ahern was mate of the schooner.

FEDERAL THIS MORNING.—The funeral of Mr. Henry A. McKenna took place from Hotel Davies this morning at 8 o'clock. The Dominion Government officials attended in a body, and the citizens generally testified, by the large number present, the esteem in which the deceased was held. His remains were conveyed by train to Hunter River station, thence to Hope River, where the interment will take place. The pall-bearers were Messrs. H. V. Palmer, H. J. Johnston, Otto R. Crabbe, W. H. Davies, Joseph McCarty and Frank Kelly.

LECTURE TO MEDICALS.—Dr. Kelly opened his course of lectures on Therapeutics before the medical students last evening, as before stated. The Doctor's introductory remarks consisted in impressing very emphatically upon the students the necessity of being well established on the primary facts before attempting their range of study of the subject. He showed that although pharmacy, or the science of preparing medicine, is entirely distinct from Therapeutics, it is evident that some acquaintance with the former is necessary to the correct appreciation of the latter; and further, as the basis of both these studies, first must come a knowledge of Materia Medica. We notice that some of our drug clerks took advantage of the Doctor's lecture. Dr. S. R. Jenkins has kindly consented to open a course on Histology, commencing Tuesday evening next.

Mr. Hixon, M. P., recently presented a memorial to Sir C. H. Tupper from the fishermen of St. John County against the enforcement of the statute which prohibits drifting for salmon outside St. John harbor. This memorial states that the law, if enforced, will entail much suffering upon the fishermen, who have carried on their operations without interference for many years.

A Souris correspondent of the Guardian writes: Although advised to desist from public speaking by his medical attendants, Rev. Mr. Dutcher continues his work in the absence of an assistant. Though quite lame he officiated yesterday morning in his own church. Dr. McIntyre, so long ill from rheumatic affection, is gradually improving and hopes are entertained that ere long he will be able to move about among his patrons and friends.

Mrs. F. H. Beer was "at home" to the choir of the First Methodist Church last evening. The Rev. Mr. Brewer and the organist, Mr. S. Earle, were present; and they and the choir speak in very flattering terms of the manner in which they were so hospitably entertained by Mrs. and Mrs. Beer. Our Methodist friends are proud of their fine choir, and they appreciate their noble efforts on behalf of the congregation. We hear that others intend following the example set by Mr. and Mrs. Beer.

The Iowa Prohibitionists, who have prevailed for some years, have another fierce fight on. Those who claim that Prohibition has failed propose to install a liquor traffic on the Gottenburg plan. They propose to give the traffic over to companies of at least 25, with a capital of not more than \$20,000, each of which will do the liquor business of a single district or city. All profits over ten per cent., after running expenses are deducted, to go to the state and be divided, 80 per cent, to the town or city and 20 per cent, to the school fund. The scheme will go to the popular vote.

AFTER THE FROST.—For several days past the water pipe in the store of A. B. MacKenzie & Co. has been frozen up. The mild weather of yesterday melted the ice in the pipe, however, and last night, after the store was closed, the tap came off and there was a considerable flow of water about the shop before the water was shut off in the cellar.

The pipe in the office of the Connolly Estate, on Queen Street, was also frozen up during the recent cold snap, and during the efforts that were made to thaw it out the tap in the office was inadvertently turned on and left in that condition. Some time during last night the ice in the pipe melted and the water began to run out over the floor of the office, soon working its way through into the store of Grant & Co. underneath. Mr. Grant says that when the store was opened this morning the water was coming through at a lively rate, and about a foot or eighteen inches of it had found its way into the cellar, damaging some of their stock.
